 What William S. Bowen says goes because he's the superintendent of the building.

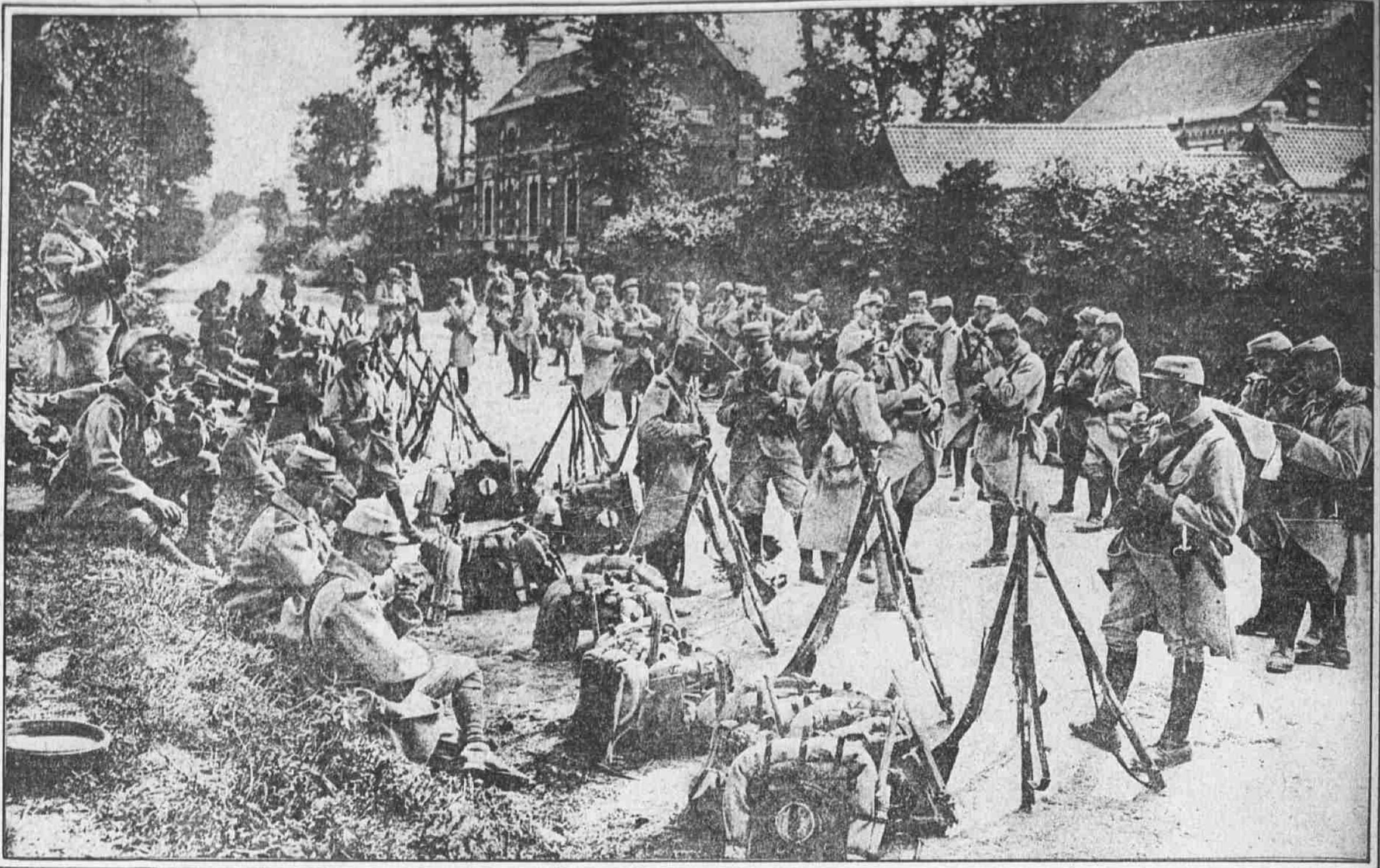

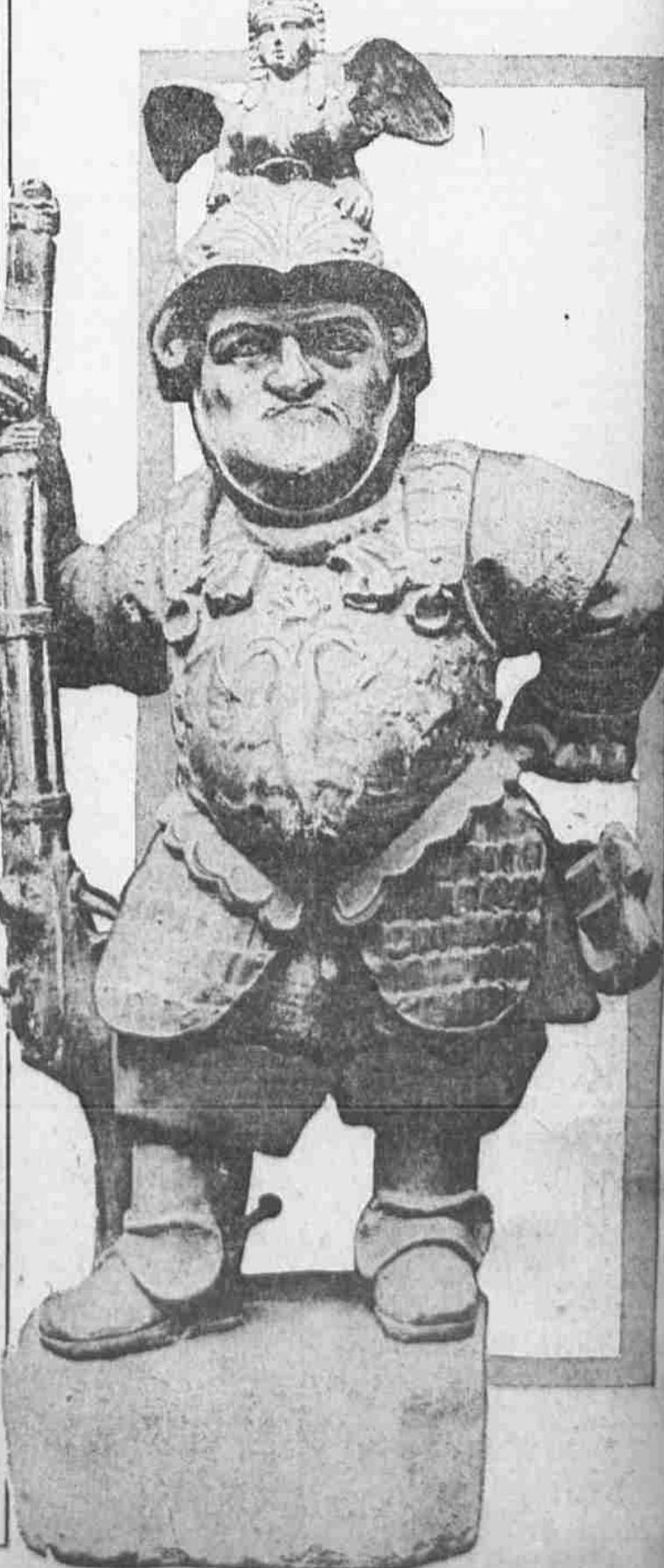
SOCIETY GIRLS AS CHORUS LADIES IN THE "FLOWER PRINCESS"
