SUFFRAGE GUARD AT WHITE HOUSE

"Silent Sentinels" With Questioning Banner Mount Guard at Gates

FIRST MILD MILITANCY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Twelve women "silent sentinels" answered "guard mount" today at the White House.

Six women are at each end of the White House grounds, where President Wilson can see them each time he enters and leaves the house.

At 10:30 President Wilson returned from his morning golf game and ran the gauntlet at the west gate.

Notified of the action by the women, the police department sent police to the scene by guard against law violations.

"ORDERS OF THE DAY" The following "orders of the day" were issued by Miss Alice Paul, commander.

"Stand at either side of the two gates with your backs to the wall. If the police interfere with you, step from place to place on the sidewalk in front of the gates."

"If the police press you further, go out to the curb and stand there; if they press you still further, move your lines to remain there, get in parade formation, march around the grounds, going from gate to gate."

"Don't come back here until your time is up." The first squad of silent suffrage sentries was led by Miss Vivian Pierce, California.

Other members of the first squad were Mrs. M. J. Fowell, Philadelphia; the Misses Jane Young, Elizabeth Smith and Whitford Frances Pepper, District of Columbia; Miss Maude Jamison, Norfolk, Va.;

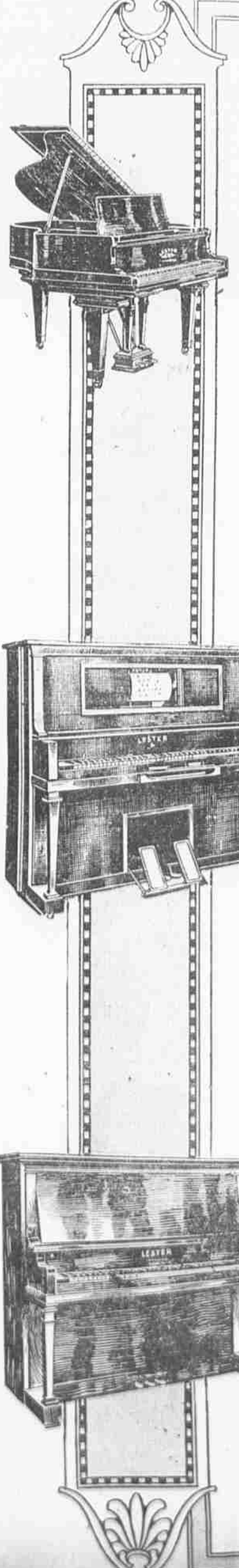
