The California Boys' Band, an organizauton of thirty-eight boys ranging in age from fifteen to seventeen years, students in the Columbia Park Boys' Club of San Francisco, came to Philadelphia today from Washington where they had played for president and Mrs. Wilson at the White House. They were escorted to City Hall by the Wanamaker Cadets and greeted hy Mayor Smith on their arrival.

The itinerary calls for a trip to Valley Forge, an inapection of the various educa-tional institutions of this city and a visit to the Baldwin Locomotve Works, where they will be the guests of Alba B. Johnson. They will also play for the University of Grand Pennsylvania and the atudents of Girard College.

The boys came to Philadelphia directly from Washington, where they gave the spe-dial exhibition of their skill before the Presi-dent. Congressional delegates from Callfornia, as well as members of both branches of the House, highly praised the band. President Wilson, after listening to several selections, said the technique displayed by the boys was worthy of the highest commen-

The boys are making the tour under the leadership of Major Sydney S. Peixotto, founder of the Columbia Boys' Club and f the leading educators in the State of California.

The members of the band are as profi-clent in calisthenics and singing as they are in rendering musical airs.


