





THEATRE IN GLASSBORO DESTROYED BY FIRE

Stores, Lodge Rooms, Restaurant and Dwelling Also Burned-Loss \$30,000.

GLASSBOHO, N. J., Jan. 26.—Fire today destroyed the big Glassboro Auditorium, containing a theatre, lodge rooms, two stores and a restaurant, and also burned a house adjoining it here on Academy street in the center of the town. The total loss is estimated at \$30,000.

The Auditorium, which was a large three-tory structure of comparatively modern onstruction, was owned by Charles Abbott. construction, was owned by Charles Abbott, His tenants, who left their full stock of goods and fixtures in the blaze, were John W. Dilks, druggist. I. Fisher, clothing: I. Bowers, restaurant. The Masons and other raternal orders which had their lodge rooms in the building also lost all of their paraphernalla and some of their records. The frame dwelling house of Mrs. Everett Jerrell, adjoining the big Auditorium, was wised out with its contents.

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
