

M'NICHOL AND BALDWIN ASSAIL BRUMBAUGH

"Traitor," "Hessian Dutchman" and Other Epithets Mark Orations at Dinner

DEMAND STERN PROBE

Senator and Speaker Agree on Governor

REPRESENTATIVE BALDWIN: Brumbaugh has betrayed the confidence of the people. The big Hessian Dutchman in Harrisburg took to the woods when the fight became too hot. He found he wanted to play golf and that his clothes needed pressing at the State's expense. He's got the wrong tee. The wildest imagination cannot say that the State ought to pay for the Governor's caddy on a golf course.

SENATOR M'NICHOL: Brumbaugh is a political traitor. He has turned on the organization that made him. He gathered around him a clique of designing politicians who thought the power of the Governor was all that was needed for control. Senator Penrose has put them in a basket and clamped the lid down on them. It's hard to tell where they'll float to.

Governor Brumbaugh was termed a "political traitor," and a "Hessian Dutchman ingrate," and severely censured by State Senator James P. McNichol and Representative Richard J. Baldwin, Speaker of the House, who addressed 700 ardent Republicans at the annual dinner of the Fifteenth Ward Republican Club at the Hotel Majestic, last night.

Senator McNichol received an ovation that lasted more than five minutes when he said that Vane leaders, holders of \$10,000 city and county offices, would not dare be candidates for re-election unless they first restored to office those of his followers who had been discharged. Senator Penrose was lauded "to the skies." Enthusiasm waxed high throughout the banquet. The features were furnished in rapid succession, however, by a series of sharp attacks on Governor Brumbaugh.

Representative Baldwin launched the attack. He criticized the Governor's expenditures of funds appropriated by the Legislature for his personal use, and said it was the duty of the Legislature to make an investigation. "The Hessian Dutchman at Harrisburg," he said, took to the woods. When the fight became too hot, he only dismounted that his pants needed pressing and went to Pinehurst to play golf.

"He got under the wrong pine tree in Maine to relax his political fighting nerve. Every Governor has duties to perform outside of the State, but it would require the wildest stretch of imagination to say that the State should pay a caddy fee for the chief executive on a golf course. "It is the duty of the Legislature to inquire into the departments of the Commonwealth when it finds that the chief of one of those departments has betrayed his trust. "Brumbaugh has betrayed the confidence of the people. Senator McNichol also attacked Brumbaugh as a "political traitor." He said: "The Governor hadn't received his certificate of election before he started to tear down the organization which has made him. He gathered together a clique of designing politicians who thought that with the power of the Governor behind them, their fight for control would be easy. "Senator Penrose has put them all in a basket and has put the lid down on them. It is a pretty hard thing to tell just where that basket is going to float to. The dinner was given in honor of Magistrate John P. Collins, former Representative A. B. Tschill was toastmaster. Other speakers were Judge Charles H. Brown, president of the Municipal Court, and Judge Eugene C. Bonnell.

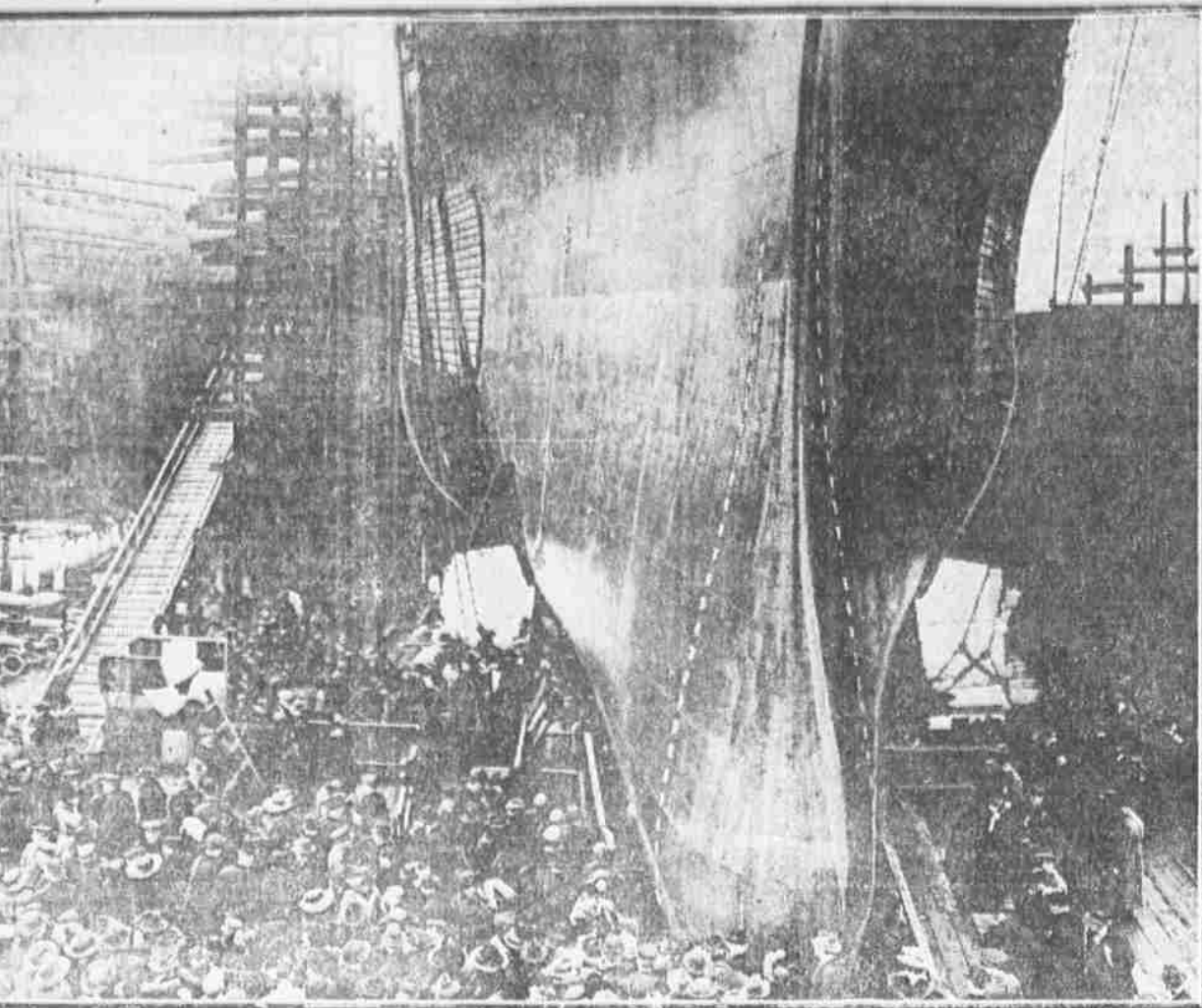

THEATRE IN GLASSBORO DESTROYED BY FIRE

Stores, Lodge Rooms, Restaurant and Dwelling Also Burned—Loss \$30,000.

GLASSBORO, N. J., Jan. 25.—Fire today destroyed the big Glassboro Auditorium, containing a theatre, lodge rooms, two stores and a restaurant, and also burned a house adjoining it here on Academy street in the center of the town. The total loss is estimated at \$30,000.

The Auditorium, which was a large three-story structure of comparatively modern construction, was owned by Charles Abbott. His tenants, who lost their full stock of goods and fixtures in the blaze, were John W. Dilks, druggist; J. Fisher, clothing; J. Bowers, restaurant. The Masons and other fraternal orders which had their lodge rooms in the building also lost all of their paraphernalia and some of their records. The frame dwelling house of Mrs. Everett Jerrill, adjoining the big Auditorium, was wiped out with its contents. The blaze was first discovered near the chimney at the peak of the building at about 2:30 a. m. Firemen are uncertain whether it originated from crossed wires or from some defect in the chimney flue. So rapidly did the flames spread through the frame interior of the Auditorium that

It was soon apparent that the structure was doomed. Chief Stewart summoned aid from neighboring towns and they sent their motor fire trucks to help in fighting the blaze which menaced the very heart of the town. The grammar school is just across the street from the Auditorium, but it was set far enough back to be out of range of the flames. Nearly to the big plant of the Whitney Glass Works and the ware sheds were on fire at one time. Local firemen, with the aid of Pittman and Woodbury firemen and other outside companies, worked valiantly and kept the fire from spreading beyond the Auditorium and the Jerrill home adjoining, although several surrounding structures were badly scorched. The Auditorium and the Jerrill house were burned to the ground and very little of their contents was saved. No one was injured fighting the big blaze.
