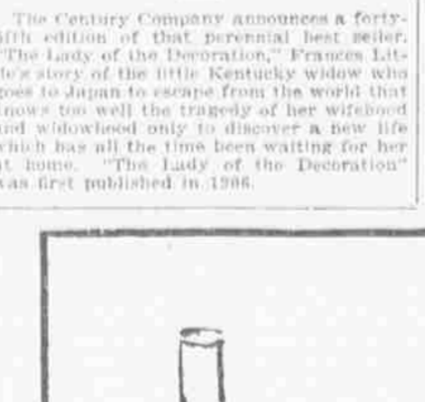

DUNSANY WILL RETURN TO WAR

Author, Hurt in Dublin Riots, Is Recuperating Before Going to France

Lord Dunsany (Edward John Moreton Drax Plunkett, Eighteenth Baron Dunsany), whose plays have become so popular on the stage and in book form, has been fighting for England as captain of the Fifth Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards. Returning from Gallipoli he was wounded in the Dublin riots and is now recuperating in Dunsany Castle preparatory to joining his regiment in France.
