Philadelphia Golf Prodigy Shoots Wizardly 76 to Repeat Over Famous Victim

PINEHURST, N. C., Feb. 1.—Norman Maxwell, Philadelphia's boy golf prodigy, entered the second round of the Valentine tournament here today by triumphing in a remarkable form against the famous Gardner White, one of this country's first ten golfers.

Maxwell broke the heart of White on the fourteenth hole when he dropped an eagle into the cup in the face of a bird four which White had just made.
