PHOTODRAMAS OF SEX NEED FINE TREATMENT

Crude Handling Mars Subjects Distorted by Some Authors. Other Film News

Sex is at one and the same time the blessing and the bane of dramatic expression. Treated understandingly, sympatheticand humanely, it motivates and makes vivid all sorts of stories. Used as an iron lever to pry up some filmsy, tawdry tale, it becomes more offensive than the padded five-reel "sweet" narrative or the footless slapstick affair. (Not that all slapsticks are footless by any means.)

The presentation today of motion pictures based on lurid, overdrawn expositions of the relation of men and women in modern society is not nearly as lad as it was four or

relation of men and women in modern so-ciety is not nearly as had as it was four or five years ago. But it does occur. And the result, ninety times out of a hundred, is a fearful hore. One of the photoplay houses yesterday displayed a film that hinged on such a relation. It was not es-pecially immoral or degrading. But it was dull beyond all description. Like most of its class, it didn't take two characters and work out their evaluation dramatically. It started with an ethical question, and the outcome was a distortion of life which hapoutcome was a distortion of life which hap-pened to fit the problem with which the scenario writer began. An excellent rule for producers (and one that most of them have adopted voluntarily) is: Never monkey with the sex buzzsaw unless you are confident you can cut out a piece of good artistic metal, without letting any chips fly into the spectators' eyes.

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ORCHESTRA HAS BIDS FROM NEARLY 50 CITIES

Forty-three Would Hear Philadelphia Organization; Thirtyone Disappointed

Applications for the services of the Philadelphia Orchestra have been received from forty-three cities, in all parts of the country, by Arthur Judson, manager of the organization. So great is the demand made upon the Orchestra that Mr. Judson has found it necessary to disappoint thirty-one of these cities.

Within the present season the players will fill twelve outside engagements other than in Washington, Baltimore and Wilnington and other communities where the Orchestra has "standing" engagements very year.

In some cases the requests for concerts have come from musical clubs; in others individuals have offered to present the Orchestra to the public, offering to risk a loss for the privilege of receiving the possible profits. Directors of musical instruction in the public schools of other cities are also lamoring for opportunity for their pupils o hear the Orchestra.

Mr. Judson expressed himself as de-lighted with the eagerness with which out-side communities are asking for engage-

"It simply shows," he said, "that the Philadelphia Orchestra is no longer a local institution. It has become a national agency for the advancement of the musical art."
