ACTED ALONE IN SUIT, LOIS WEBER MAKES INVESTOR DECLARES

Farmer Says He Sought to Protect Himself in Ventnor Syndicate Action

ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 7.—George R. Conover, the Burlington County farmer whose efforts to realize in excess of two \$100,000 bonds have drawn \$500,000 corporations, the Ventnor syndicate and the West Jersey Mortgage Company, into receivership fifteen months ago, denied before Vice Chancellor Learning that he was actuated by any ulterior motive.

"I was acting in my own interests," said Conover, a plainly dressed, gray-haired man of ex-dignified aspect, in reply to a question from ex-Judge Conover, who presided over the trial of the case, which was held in the West Jersey Mortgage Company, which had been made a party as trustee for the West Jersey Mortgage Company.

Conover testified that he bought four bonds of the Ventnor syndicate upon the advice of a friend, who assured him they were a safe investment. He understood that the Guaranty Trust Company had guaranteed the payment of the bonds, because its name appeared upon the bonds as trustee.
