smokestacks, looking like a beautiful picture. The man was sinking beneath the waves and vanishing light seemed to play around the vessel. The men went hysterically and cursed the Germans as they watched.

"Suddenly there came a puff of smoke, a flash of flame followed by a roar of an explosion, and the German went up amidst ships and sank. The submarine had vanished and we were all alone on the ocean, with darkness coming on apace."

"We had two small boats, which were ample for the thirty-six men from the ship. They were lashed together and we all took to the water. We kept pulling and pulling, steering our course by a small compass and set out for the coast of Scotland nearly 200 miles away.

"Terrible Experience "I never went through such an experience and I hope I never will again. When darkness came it grew bitterly cold and the waves tossed us around like pieces of driftwood. The men who were in coats of straw suffered terribly, and to make matters worse, it began to snow. When we were out three hours, all hope was given up of reaching the coast, for no one could possibly live through that blizzard in an open boat.

"We were drifting around at midnight when a faint puff of light was seen in the distance. We shouted as loudly as we could and a searchlight began to play through the curtain of snow. In some manner we were located and a boat sent out for us. The boat was a British torpedo boat, and I know that the situation was serious.

"Suddenly there came a puff of smoke from the tower and a shell screamed across our bows. That was enough for our captives. He stopped the boat as soon as possible and we were riding the waves when the 'U-53' came close to us.

"The Dutchman gave us dead to rights," shouted the captain to the men who came scurrying to the deck. "Don't try any funny business, we'll all go down with the ship. Let them do their dirty work and say nothing. Here you—turning to a seaman—throw over the ladder and let 'em climb aboard!"

"Germans Pay a Visit "I looked up at the masthead at this juncture and saw that we were being watched. For a moment I thought that we could say that we were on an American vessel and get away with it, but it turned out that the Germans knew more about the ship than I did myself.

"I looked over the side of the submarine and an officer took his seat in the stern. A dozen sailors manned the oars and pulled toward our ship. They climbed up the rope ladder, jumped ashore and formed in a straight line. The lieutenant walked forward and saluted our captain.

"The ceremonies—they looked like that to me—were very brief. The lieutenant, smiling, saluted and offered his compliments, and the captain, grave-faced and silent, returned the salute. He knew that argument was useless and wanted it over with as soon as possible. The crew, some of them barefooted, others with nothing to protect them but their thin shirts, were told to get into the lifeboats. While they were getting them ready, the German officer shouted: "Are there any neutrals on board?"

"No one answered, and I suddenly found my voice. Rushing up to him and forgetting to salute, I stammered: "Yes, sir; there's me and two others. We're Americans."

"He told me to bring the others before him, and when they appeared they were in some shape. The lieutenant asked: "What are you doing on this ship?" he asked.

"I told him that we were boxers on our way to meet some prizefighters in England and he laughed and said that he hoped we would lick everybody on the island. He wished me luck and seemed to be a real pleasant sort of a fellow. And you can imagine my surprise when his officer asked me to take two American cigarettes!"

"We were told that we had twenty minutes to get our things together and climb into the lifeboats. The other members of the crew then asked if they could go below and get their coats and some wraps, but the German scowled at them and told them that they were lucky to be alive. Already the men were shivering in the small boats, and it is a wonder they didn't freeze to death.

"Watch the Ship Go Down "When we got our things together, the lieutenant noticed a camera that I was carrying, and promptly took it away. Then he shook hands with us, hoped we wouldn't be helpless; it was just like a terrible dream. When the dark shape shook off the waves like a big dog, a long, narrow boat skimmed over the surface.
