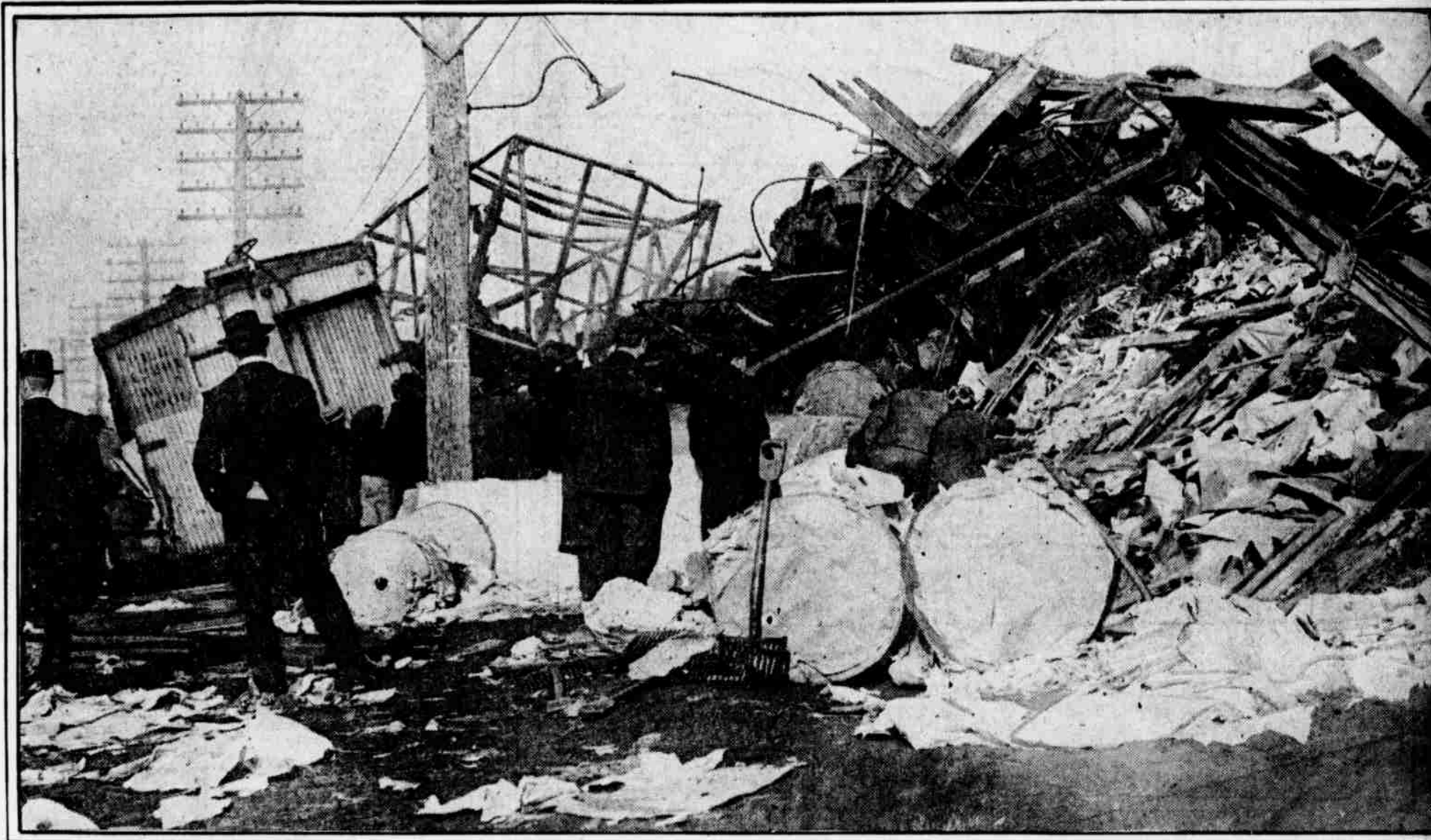
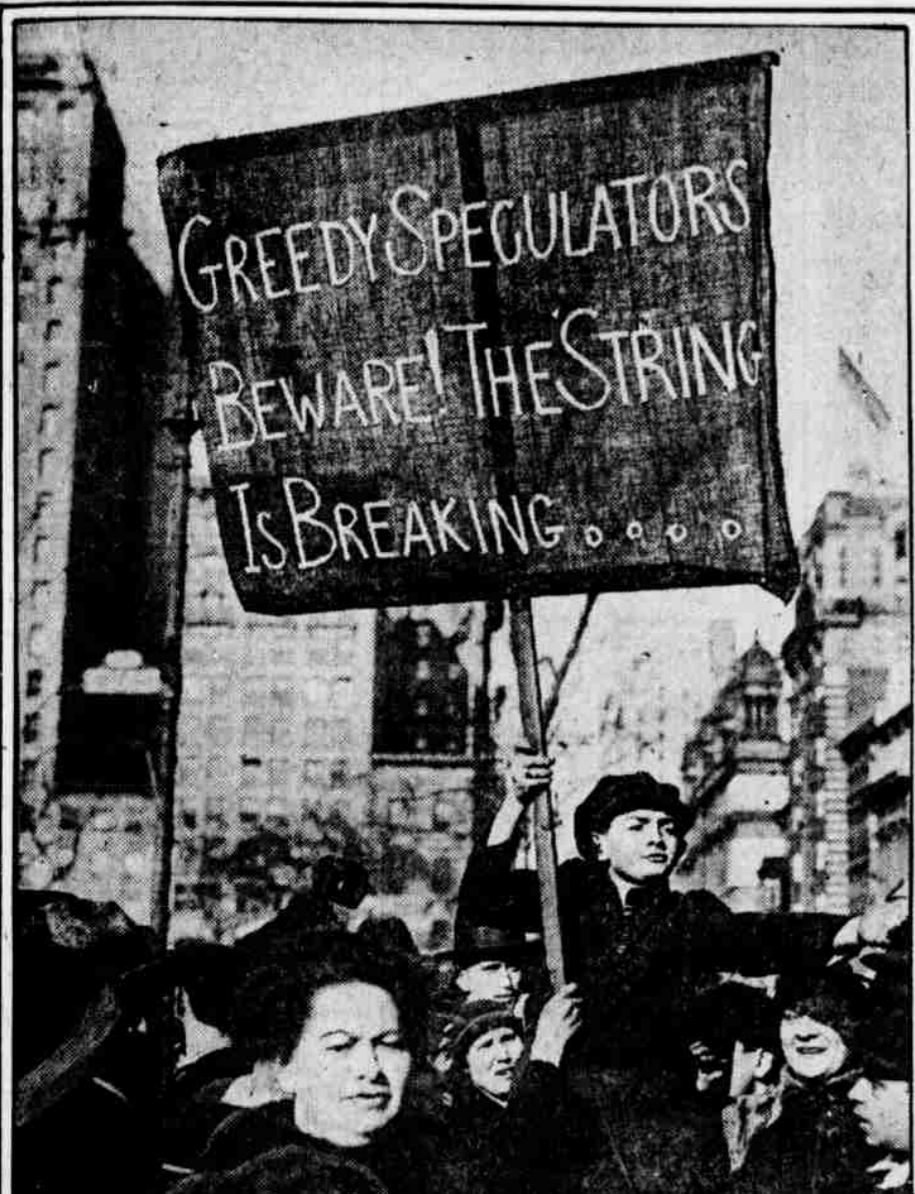


PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD TIED UP BY FATAL CRASH AT BRISTOL, PA.
