Important financial interests in Wall street continued to maintain waiting policy. Price movements in control of bears. Prices of Curb lower. Wheat higher; cotton lower. Price of bar silver lower. Copper companies declared dividends. Several extra dividends declared.

NEW YORK, March 1.

The bear element on the Stock Exchange had confidence in the short position creased today by the manner in which they construed the news of the suggested German-Mexican combination., Little else was spoken of as a market factor except the documents indicating this plan which seemed to make a new menace for an actual international breach. There was a general disposition to keep away from the buying side of the market by the smaller class of commissionouse clients, and with the important financial interests continuing to pursue a waiting policy, price movements for a good part of the day were in absolute bear control.

It was insisted that bear combinations had been waiting for United States Steel common to sell ex dividend, which it did this morning, for an opportune time to begin a campaign against that stock. Soon after the initial sales some large blocks were thrown on the market, Herrick & Berg selling 5000 shares and forcing the price down to 103%, but the low range reached brought in a new demand, and it was not long before the stock made a good rally.

The Bethlehem Steel issues did not have what the Street could call a shadow of support. The banking interests which seemed to have charge of the recent djustment of capitalization did not offer much opposition to short selling and liquidation of those issues. This was shown by the manner in which the "B" stock dropped from 105% to 103, while the rights to subscribe to the new stock at par yielded from 61/2 to 31/2.

Industrial Alcohol was an instance, however, where inside support appeared. That stock was offered down early to 118, but good buying quickly put its price up to above 120.

Bonds moved in about the same manner as stocks, some issues selling off on mall trading, with the Anglo-French 5s yielding to 914.

CURB TRADERS WITHDRAW BUYING ORDERS AND MOST ISSUES DECLINE

NEW YORK, March 1.

The tangled condition of the international situation, which was made more cute by the statements in the morning papers about Germany asking Mexico to join against United States had an influence in causing a withdrawal of buying orders from the mass of Curb stocks. Nearly all the issues which were stively traded in on the Broad Street Curb today sold at substantial concessions, with several of them established at new low records.

United Motors reflected an absence of support, declining from 39 to the new low record of 36; Zinc Concentrating sold at the new low of 21, and Submarine dropped from 23% to 20%. The heaviest loss was in Mariin Arms, which yielded from 93% to 85.

The oil stocks were generally heavy, Standard Oil of New York declining rom 288 to 281 and Standard Oll of New Jersey selling at 686.

The independent oil stocks were generally lower, with Sinclair Oil falling m 55% to 53%. Merritt was strong, with sales at 17 to 17%. Cosden & Co.


