TWO DETECTIVES ARREST THREE HOLD-UP MEN

"Prize Fighters" Surrender Without a Struggle When Confronted by Sleuths After Robbing Man

Three self-termed "prize fighters" surrendered to two harmless-looking plain-clothes men early today without the slight-est sign of a struggle after a hold-up at Seventh and Arch streets, according to the
