

BARRED TO METHODISTS

N. J. Conference Disapproves Membership in Orders That Have Buffets

ATLANTIC CITY, March 8.—Jersey Methodists were virtually ordered out of all fraternalities which permit the service of drinks in a resolution adopted this morning by the New Jersey Conference. The Rev. Melville E. Snyder, in his report as superintendent of Trenton district, referred to a wave of indignation following the Billy Sunday campaign in Trenton. District superintendents called attention to the incorporation of conference and urged need of legislation to govern the election of trustees of church properties. Cheers for President Wilson followed the declaration of Clarence Truitt Wilson, secretary of the Board of Temperance, that the President signed the "bone dry" Washington and anti-liquor advertising bills under the greatest pressure ever brought to bear on a President in one of the most critical eras of the country.

"Congress passed these bills while leaders of the W. C. T. U. and the Anti-Saloon League were pleading with them not to go too far in the eyes of a dry America of the United States. It is coming fast. The cars are running ahead of the engine. This has occurred in six States in six weeks. Nine thousand newspapers are refusing to take liquor advertising over seven thousand editors signed a petition for the passage of a law closing the mails to newspapers carrying liquor advertising. The sentiment of the people is away ahead of the temperance leaders."
