MRS. DUKE'S GOLD BAG FOUND; DRIVER JAILED

Caught Trying to Pawn Former Cordelia Biddle's Property. She Is Merciful

A gold mesh bag, set with sapphires and diamonds and valued at \$800, the property of Mrs. Angier B. Duke, who was Miss Cordelia Biddle, of this city, has reappeared as "Exhibit A" against Frederick Flaherty, a chauffeur, held by the police in New York on suspicion of larceny. Mrs. Duke lost the bag last month. It was a wedding present from her sister-in-law, Mrs. Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, Jr. Flaherty was arrested, the police say, while attempting to pawn the bag for \$100. He said he had found it. He was held in \$1000 bail for a further hearing. Mrs. Duke, now living at 1009 Fifth avenue, said she would not prosecute Flaherty. She is satisfied with the return of the bag. In June, 1915, Mrs. Duke lost a diamond bracelet valued at \$30,000 on the golf course at Great Neck, L. I. It was found and returned to her by a caddy.

RAE TANZER AIMS FISTS AT WAX, LOVE PIRATE

NEW YORK, March 9.—Rae Tanzer, the central figure in the famous "Oliver Osborne" case, caused a sensation at her trial on a perjury charge today, when she made a violent effort to attack Charles H. Wax in the courtroom. Wax, who had sworn that it was he and not James H. Osborne, former District Attorney, who wooed the milliner, had just testified that he had given Miss Tanzer money on various occasions. "It's a lie," screamed the young woman, rushing from her seat toward where Wax sat. Her fists were doubled and she looked belligerent. An attorney seized her and held her hand over her mouth to choke off her screams. "Take your hand off her mouth," ordered the judge. The attorney did so and the young woman's screams could be heard throughout the building. She soon subsided and returned to her seat. She made no further outburst as Wax told of trips he had made to hotels with her and of various gifts of money he had bestowed upon her.

JERSEY WOMAN SEARCHED BY BRITISH IN BERMUDA

NEW YORK, March 9.—The British steamship Vauban, arriving here today from Rio de Janeiro, put into Bermuda last Sunday while two women, Government agents, examined Mrs. J. V. Zink, 405 Palisades avenue, Hoboken, N. J. Passengers aboard the ship said Mrs. Zink's stateroom was searched, a package of letters removed and that she was subjected to a rigid search. Mrs. Zink was met at the pier here by her brother-in-law, E. J. Zink, 22 Summit avenue, West Hoboken, and whisked away in a taxicab before she could be questioned. The Vauban, it was stated, turned into Bermuda over protests of the passengers, after it had been posted. Mrs. Zink went to Rio de Janeiro last November to meet her husband, who is said to be a chemist with a large business in South America. She was a passenger on the Vauban when that vessel went down on the coast during German-raider activities.

DEATH OF GUTHRIE HARD BLOW TO PENNSYLVANIA

Vance C. McCormick Recalls President's Esteem for Late Ambassador

HARRISBURG, March 9.—Vance C. McCormick, Democratic national chairman, who with the late Ambassador George W. Guthrie played a leading part in the reorganization of the Democratic party several years ago, said when informed of the death of Mr. Guthrie in Tokio:

"I consider Mr. Guthrie's death a great national misfortune and a distinct loss to the State. I never knew a man whose life was so singly devoted to public service as his. His character was sturdy and his ideals were high. Naturally he was loved by those who knew him, and to them his death is tragic."

"I know President Wilson held Mr. Guthrie in very high esteem, for when a friend spoke to the President about his fitness for the Tokio post the President replied that such recommendations were unnecessary; that he knew the worth of Mr. Guthrie, and that no place in the presidential gift was too good for him."

"Mr. Guthrie's death is a loss to the good government forces in Pennsylvania. To him as much as to any man is due the credit for the movement which gave the State a vigorous party. His death is deplorable."

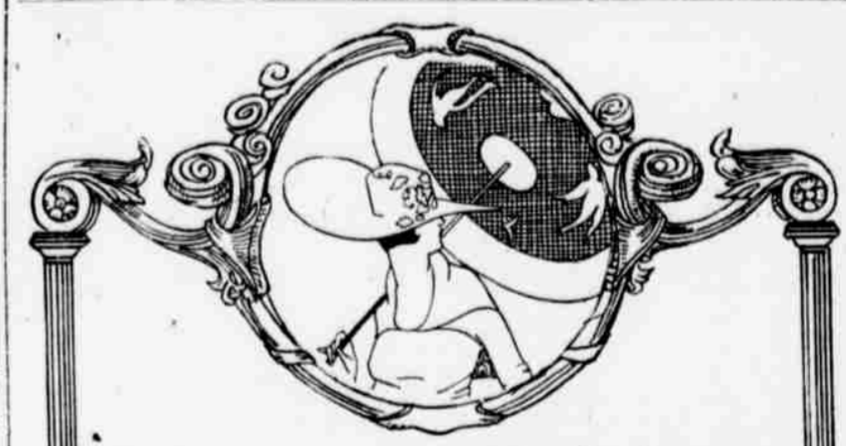
VILLA SACKS DURANGO, SAYS LETTER TO TEXAN
