Evening Ledg Published Strange Adventures in I nd at Earth's Center. Reply to Message Saturday

Edgar Rice Burroughs, author of the Tarzan" stories and "At the Earth's Core," all of which have been published in the EVENING LEDGER, has received a strange etter from an Englishman in Algiers which ids fair to eclipse even the war in the inerest it will arouse. He then bored his way back to Pellucidar and his wife, Dian, but not until first leaving a complete telegraph outfit in the sands of the desert. There Mr. Burroughs jost all trace of the intrepid adventurer, and "At the Earth's Core" came to an end. The letter which Mr. Burroughs received follows. Edgar Rice Burroughs, Esq., "Oak Park, Illinois.
"Dear Sir—I think that I have run across one of the most remarkable coincidences odern literature. But let me start at the I am, by profession, a wanderer upon

the face of the earth. I have no trade-nor my other occupation. "My father bequeathed me a competency : some remoter ancestor—a lust of roam. I carefully and without extravagance.

"For the last year I have been purchas-ing adventure in North Africa. Several months ago I came upon some back num-bers of the EVENING LEDGER in the read-

room of a club here in Algiers.

I became interested in your story, 'At the Earth's Core,' not so much because of the probability of the tale as of a great and abiding wonder that people should be paid real money for writing such impossible trash. You will pardon my candor, but it is necessary that you understand my mental attitude toward this particular story-that you may credit that which follows,
"Shortly thereafter I started for the Sa

hara in search of a rather rare species of antelope that is to be found only occasionally within a limited area at a certain seaof the year. My chase led me far from the haunts of civilized man.

"It was a fruitless search, however, in so far as antelope is concerned; but one night as I lay courting sleep at the edge of a little cluster of date palms that surround an ancient well in the midst of the arid, shift-ing sands, I suddenly became conscious of a strange sound coming apparently from the earth beneath my head.


