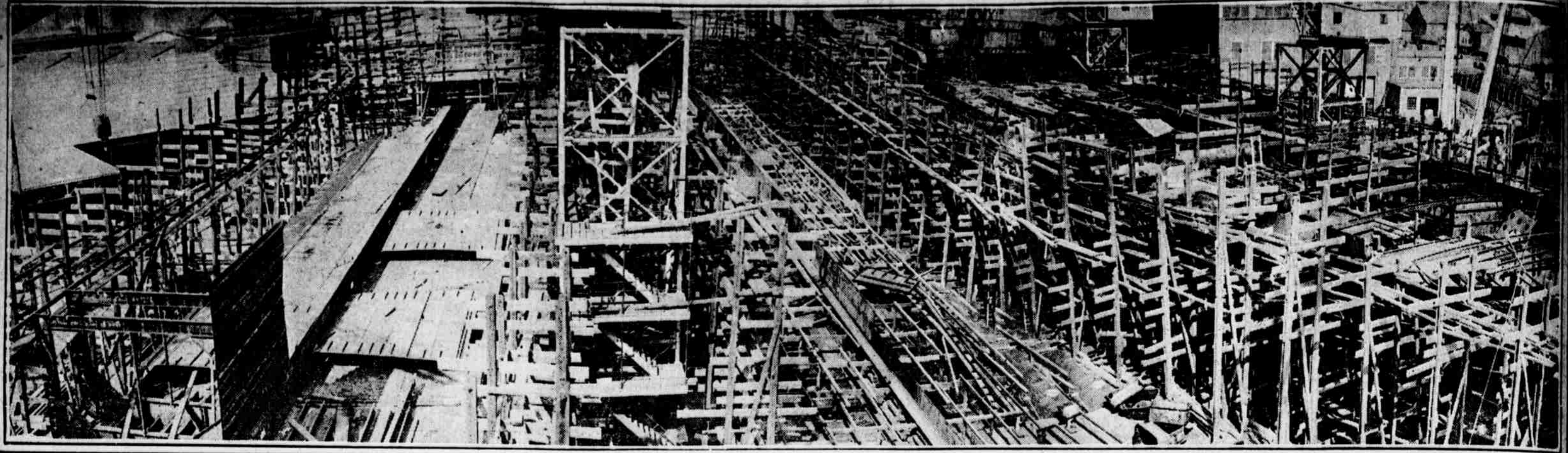


WILMINGTON PRESENTS A PANORAMA OF PROGRESS AND PROSPERITY TO PHOTOGRAPHIC PORTRAYAL

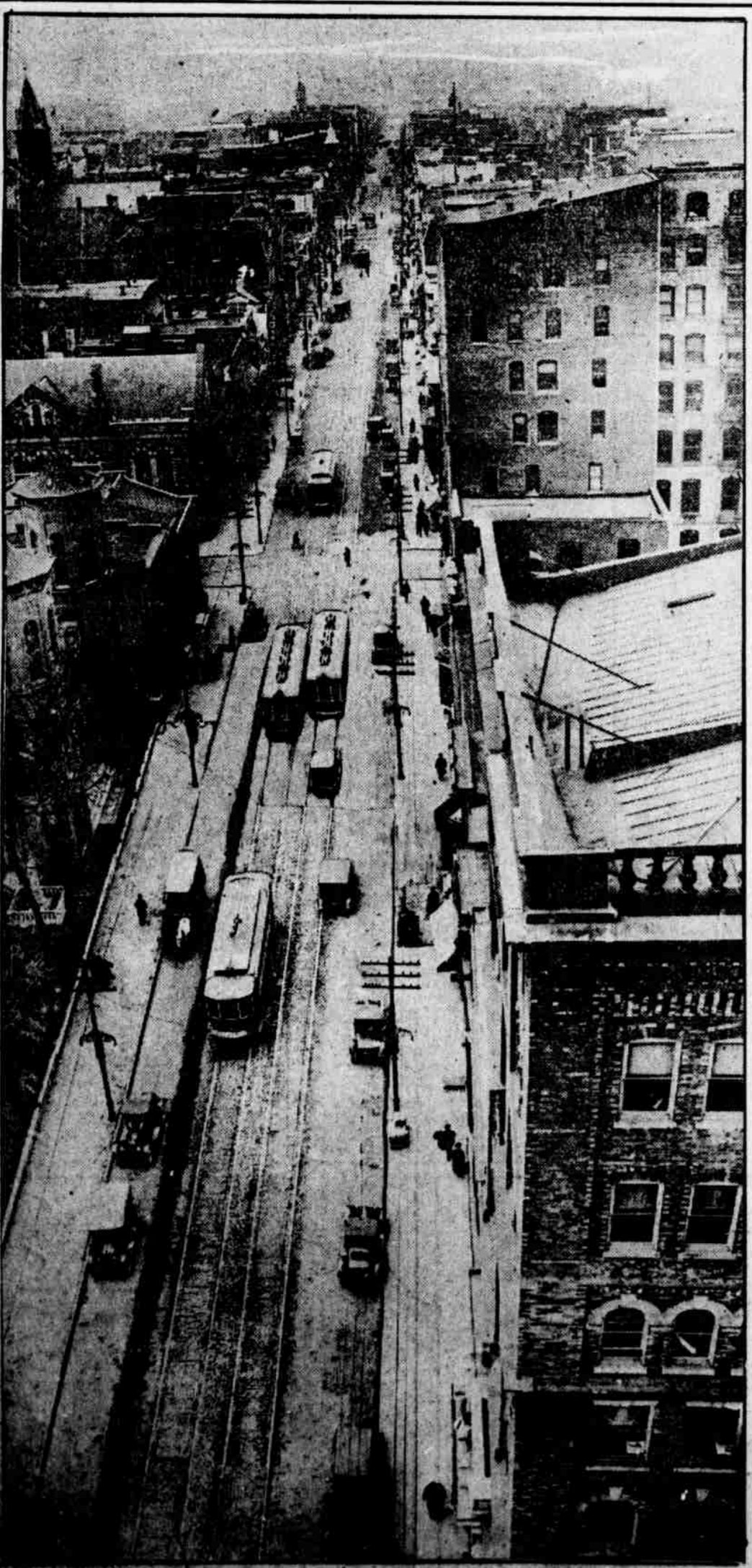


"CLEARED FOR ACTION" TO BEGIN CONSTRUCTION OF AMERICAN COMMERCE-CARRIERS

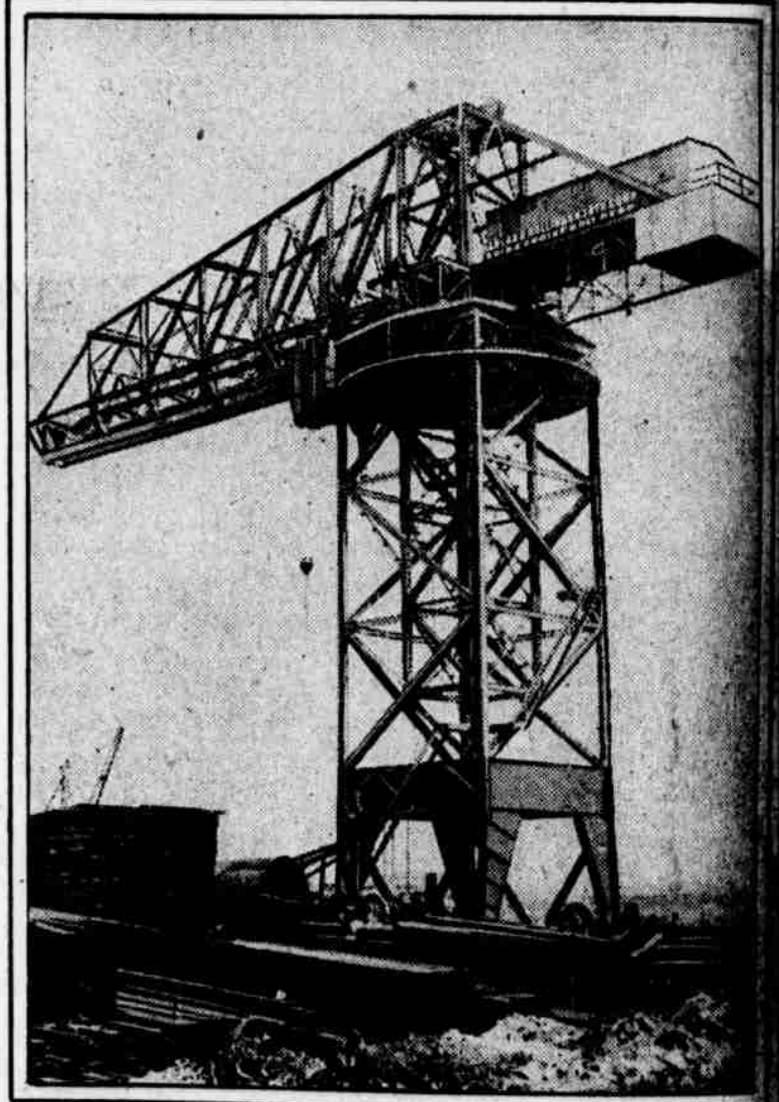


FROM THE WATERFRONT WILMINGTON REFLECTS A VISTA OF INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITY

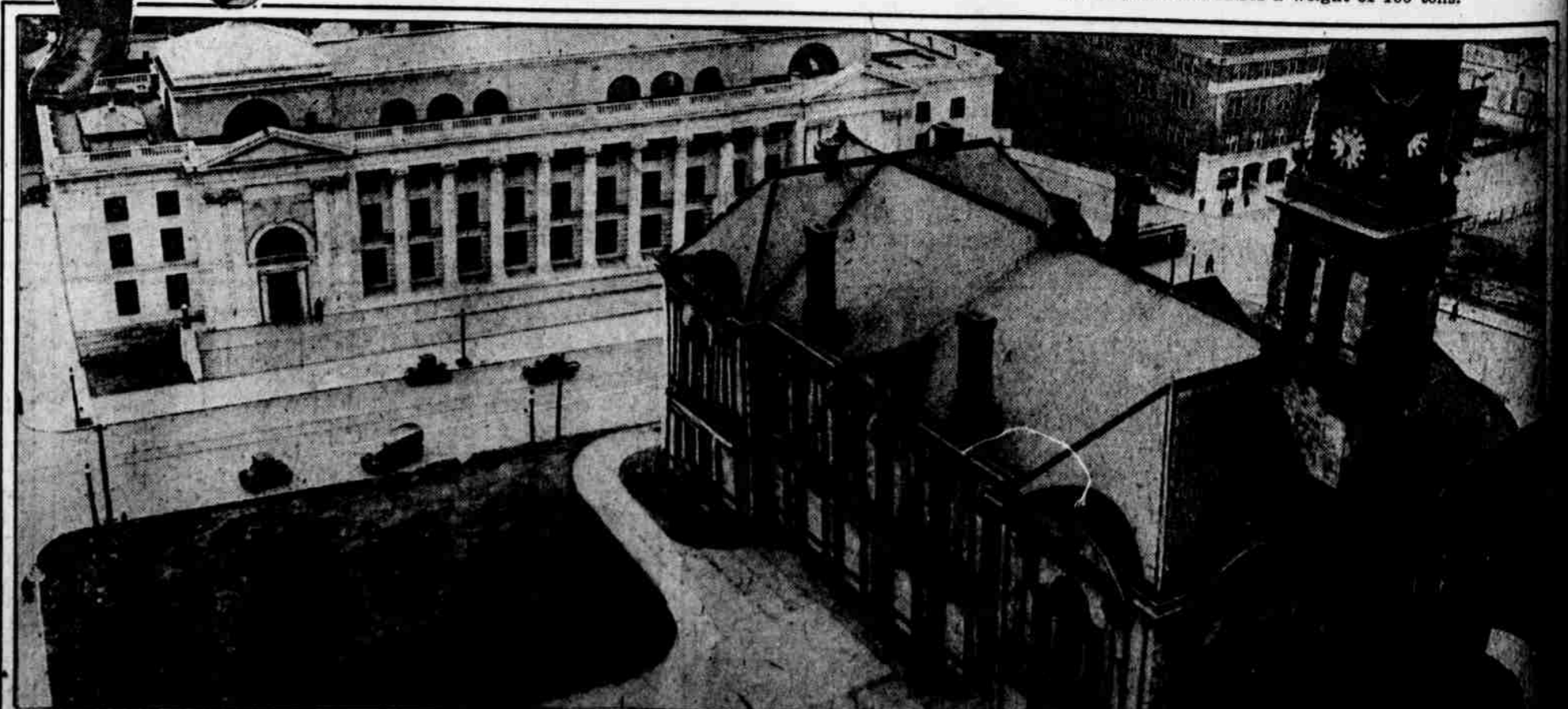


CITIZENS OF WHOM WILMINGTON IS PROUD
