Germans, if They Land, Will Respect Neither Property Nor People

gently since the publication of those srticles he has been accused of being too rabidiy pro-Teuton. His talk this after-noon, Thrice Armed is He Who Hath His rel Just," was an emphatic contradicof those charges.

"The German war lords are not good sports," he said contemptuously. "Good sports would not have sunk the Lusitania; would not have ravaged Belgium; would get have shot Edith Cavell.

"We've got to wake up to the fact that we can't go to Germany and not expect Germany to go to war with us, as so many who do not believe in preparedness seem to think.

CALLS GERMANY "LICKED" "Germany is licked, but she's a long way "Germany is licked, but she's a long way from being heaten. If she sends an expeditionary force here you may expect the same things to happen as did in Belgium and France. What we regard as patriotism becomes, from the German viewpoint, treason, something to shoot you for. If Barbara Frietchie had said to a Prussian Stonewall-Jackson: Shoot, if you must, my gray, old head, he'd have done it, as a matter of course, even without her asking him. It may only be a remote possibility—this landing of a force here—but if it comes our property will be destroyed, our women outraged. For the Germans at the present time remind me of a huge lunatic asylum let loose. It is our duty to help round them up. But we have been sluggered.

Mr. Cobb described the Hohenzollerns a "Prussian paranolacs" who were lead-one of the finest nations in the world

A PARANOIAC BREED "They cannot last long, however, these Prussian paranoiacs," he said. "With China a republic and with Russia a repub-

lic, it is not logical that one of the most cultured and most intelligent nations will long be satisfied to be ruled by an exponent of the divine right." One of the finest acts the United States could perform. Mr. Cobb said, would be the sending of some of our troops abroad. The

moral effect of the American flag over a few lines of trenches in Flanders with our soldier boys fighting in those trenches would be incalculable, he declared. Mr. Cobb read a cablegram just received by George Horace Lorimer from Lord Northcliffe instructing the editor of the Saturday Evening Post to turn over to the American Red Cross \$1000, which is being paid for an article Lord Northeliffe is writing for the Post.

Dr. Charles Hart, director of the South eastern Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Red Cross, was chairman of the meeting and introduced Mr. Cobb.

ST. LOUIS, April 12.




