A Notable Contribution to Philadelphia Architecture

The main display building, shown at the extreme left of the above etching is 29 feet long and 15 feet wide. Just under the dome are 12 art panels, done in ornamental colored glass.

Each panel depicts some use of gasoline-automobiles, motorcycles, motor boats, motor trucks, etc. The display building occupies a commanding position in the car-court, which is paved with Atlantic Asphalt.
