Tom McNamara, Reid and Hoffner Complete Philmont Match for May 20—Another Eagle

The first local tournament will be played at Philmont on May 20. The players will be Gil Nichols, who has been knocking them all over backward by his sudden return to past brilliance this winter; Tom McNamara, home from a triumphant tour of the South; Wilfred Reid, the former International British team player, and Charlie Coffner, the Philmont pro.

It is likely that Nichols and McNamara will be paired off against Hoffner and Reid. A great match is sure to result, no matter how the pairings are made.

The pros have adopted a generous policy with regard to golf this year, many of them having exhibited matches without thought of any particular purse.
