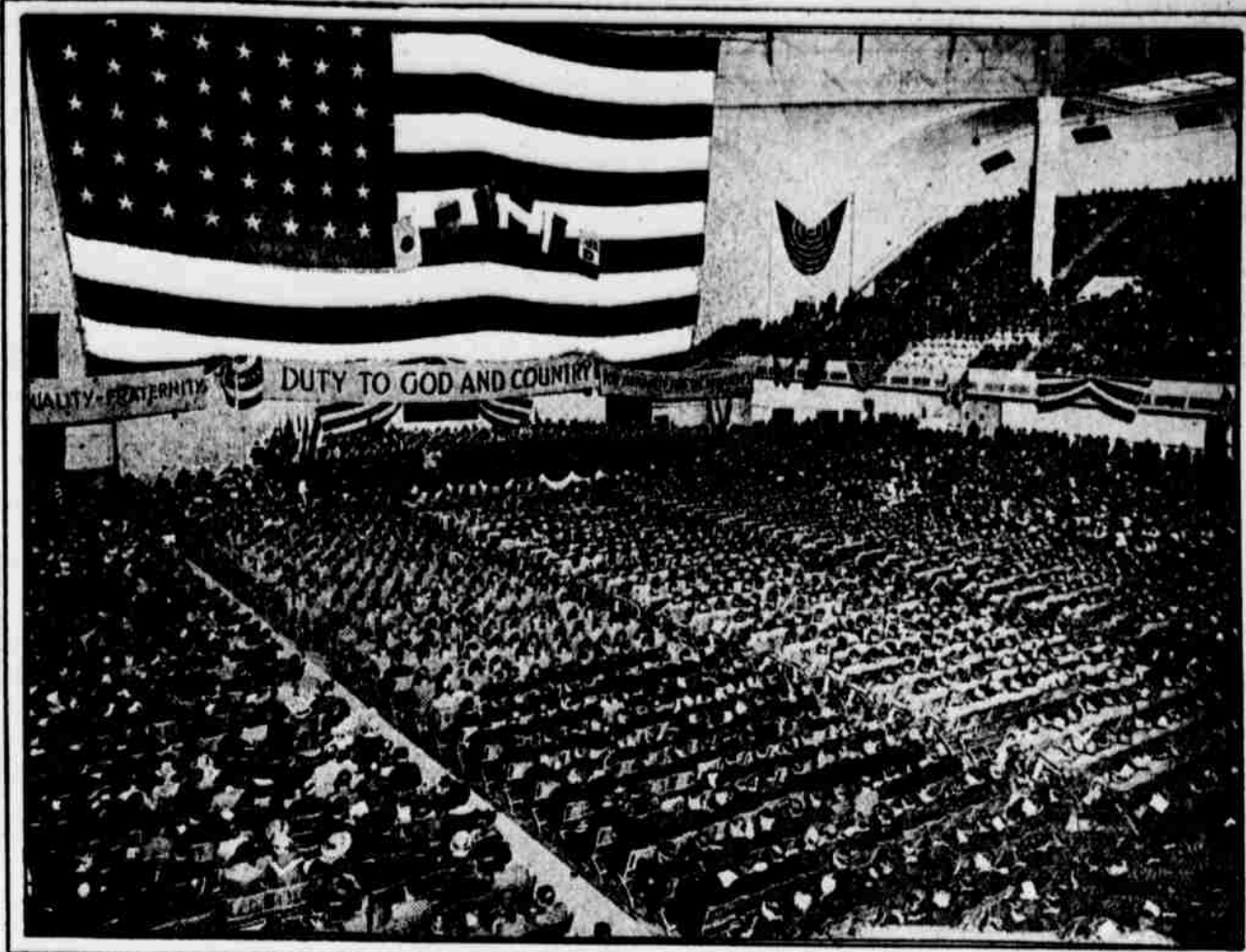


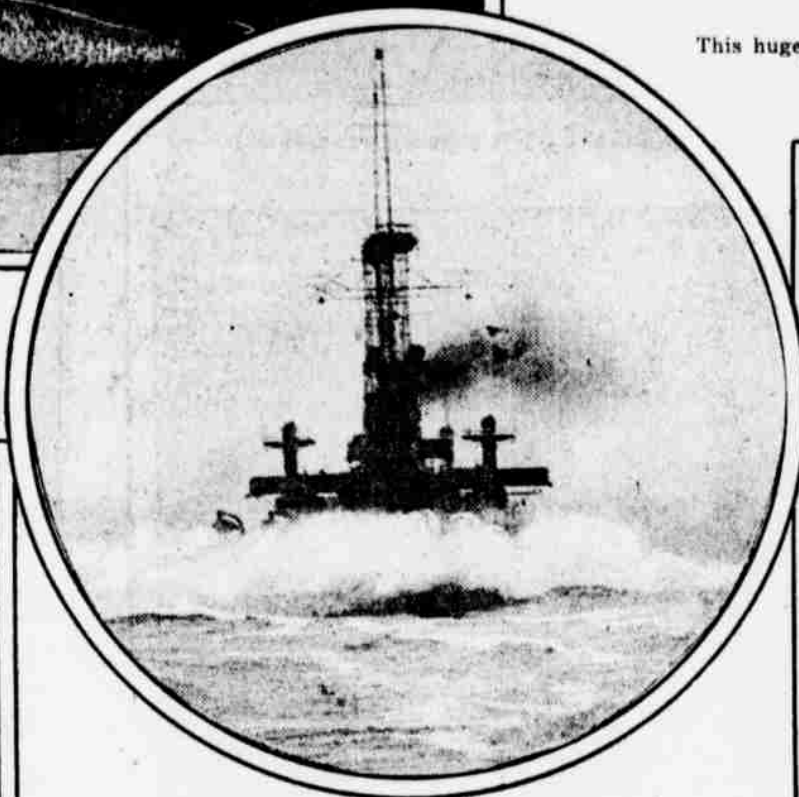

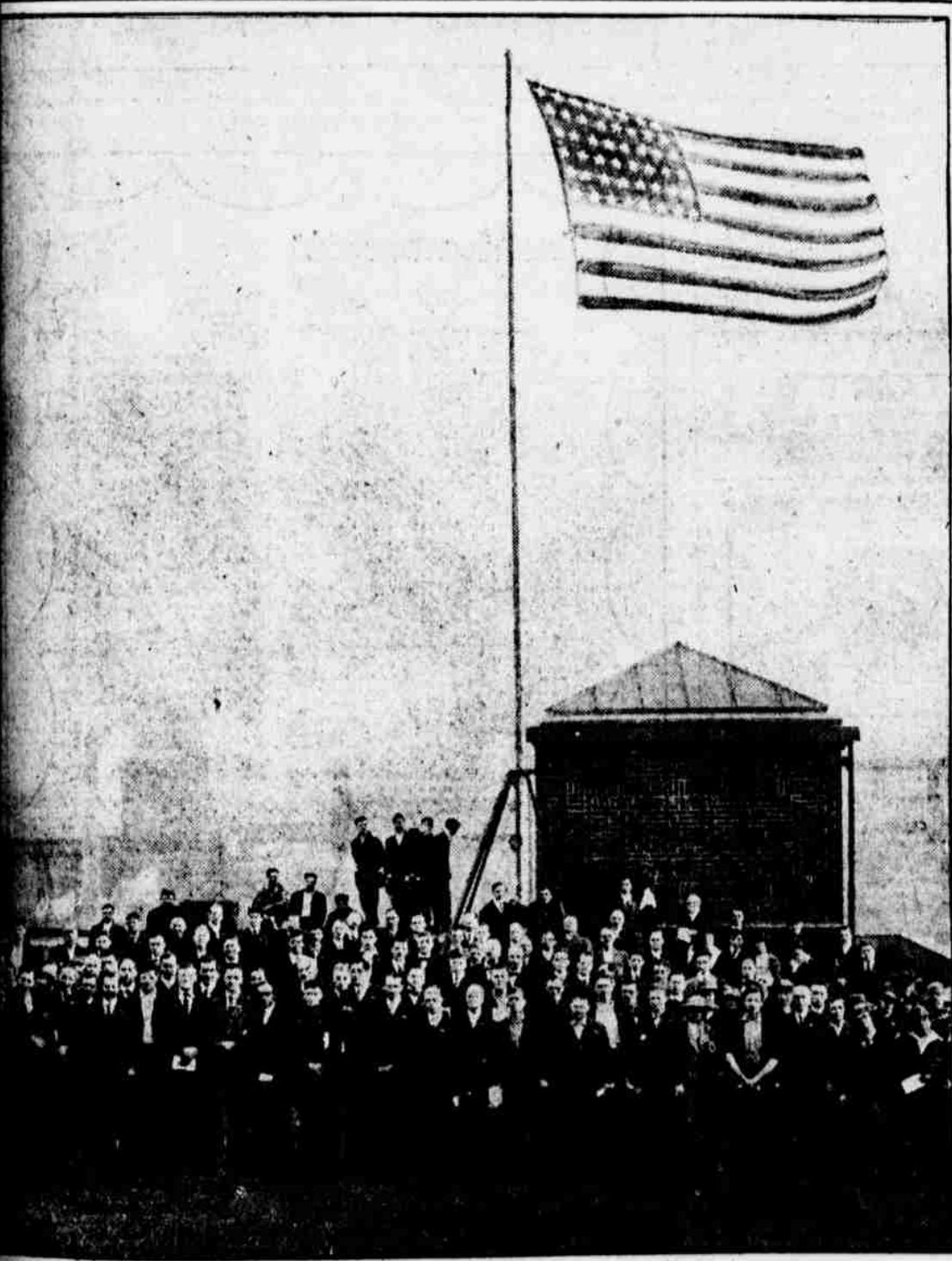
FIFTEEN THOUSAND SEE FLAG PRESENTED TO AMBULANCE UNIT
