



Man Acquitted After Slaying Boland Will Remain Single Several Months

GIRL'S MOTHER TALKS

Miss Sykes May Complete Nurses' Training Course Before Marriage, Parent Says

Ellis D. Frigar and Miss Amanda Sykes will not be married for several months. it was declared today by Mrs. F. D. Sykes, 2711 North Park avenue. She said there were no definite plans for the wedding of her daughter and the man who was acquitted last night of the murder of Edward Boland last August in Fairmount Park. It had been intimated by Congressman John R. K. Scott, in his plea to the jury for a verdict for Frigar, that the two would be married almost at once, if he was set free.

was set free. "Their intentions are just what they have been since they became engaged." said Mrs. Sykes. "but they are not going to be married today, nor in a few days. My daughter has still nine or ten months of the training course at Jefferson Hospital to complete, and it may be that she will not be married until then."

Miss Sykes went to her parents' home with her mother after the jury brought in the verdlet in the Court of Oyer and Ter-miner last night and her flance left court with his father, John Frigar. Miss Sykes was downtown on business this morning. Friends of Frigar say he has left the city for several days for a rest.

After the trial neither Frigar nor his fancee would make any statement relative to the acquittal, which established probably a record for speed in this city for capital In freeing him the jury deliberated

cases. In freeing him the jury deliberated only nincteen minutes. Dramatic scenes were witnessed in the Court of Oyer and Terminer both before and after the acquital. Hardly had the words "not guilty" failen from the lips of Frank Lenoir, foreman of the jury, than the room rang with cheers and applause and the boung engineer was showered with one young engineeer was showered with congratulations.

gratulations. Among those who congratulated Miss Sykes were Mrs. Wessel and Miss Dorothy Wessel, the wife and daughter of the judge before whom the trial was conducted.

APPLAUSE SUBSIDES

The applause, died away instantly, as many persons realized that their emotional display had fractured court efiquette. But the sooner had the courtroom come to an-other hush before an aged man, the tears streaming down his cheeks, arose from h teat just behind Mrs. Wessel and impulsively rushed toward the place where the twenty-three-year-old s ayer sat with his counsel.

The defendant flung his arms about him. The man was John Frigar, father of the youth tried for his life. Parent and son embraced each other.



Probe Into Bituminous and Anthracite Trade Conditions

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Representa-tive Howard, of Atlanta, Ga., has intro-duced a resolution requesting the Federal Trade Commission to investigate prices of trade commission to investigate prices of both bituminous coal and anthracite, to de-termine whether the profits on coal are reasonable, judged by just, profits of other industries; also to investigate prices charged for engines, cars, other equipment and supplies used by railroads and entering into the manufacture and covering of ininto the manufacture and operation of in dustrial establishments generally; to de-termine whether there are existing agreents as to prices"among coal operator and whether conditions justify Congress it directing the President to take over such coal mines as are found to be exacting ex-orbitant prices, \$500,000 to be appropri-ated for the use of the commission in the investigation

One of Representative Howard's conten tions is that whereas proper equipment of the railroads has enabled shippers of coal to make unprecedented profits, many among them, are opposing before the Interstate Commerce Commission an increase in railroad rates to meet the largely increased expenses of the railroads, of which the high price for coal is a prominent feature.


