

JUST GOSSIP ABOUT PEOPLE

Many Swearing in as Assistants in Pennsylvania Base Hospital No. 10—Younger Men Are Signing Up in Great Numbers for All Departments

Did you know that Eddy Weaver and Stephen Downs, Howard Weaver and a host of others have signed up with the unit from the Pennsylvania Hospital, which is to leave under sealed orders at some time soon, but not designated. I don't know how it strikes you, but it seems to me a splendid thing that the Pennsylvania Hospital, the oldest established hospital in the United States and conducted through private means without any State contributions for nearly two hundred years, should be the first base hospital called upon to go, and should be the first one in this city to report and be sworn in ready to go within a week's time. And when they go some of us will know, but it may be as soon as next week.

As the minutes of the yearly report of the hospital, which were read yesterday afternoon, said: "When war seemed imminent with Mexico last summer and troops were ordered to the border, the services of the Pennsylvania Hospital were offered to the Government, following the practice in every war with which our country has been confronted since it became a nation. Since then Richard H. Harte, as director, has been authorized to form for the American Red Cross a unit for a base hospital, to be known as the Pennsylvania Hospital Unit of the Red Cross, No. 10."

Since the above was written the "Pennsylvania Hospital Unit of the Red Cross," No. 10, has been called for by the Government for service in France and will soon leave for duty. The unit consists of 25 physicians and surgeons, 65 trained head nurses and 150 other persons as assistants, orderlies, etc. Through a large majority of the doctors and nurses have been connected at some time with the Pennsylvania Hospital, ten doctors and eight nurses are taken from the active staff of today. Miss Dunlop, the head nurse, is going with them.

The doctors of the staff who are going are Dr. Richard H. Harte, Dr. George W. Norris, Dr. Arthur Newlin, Dr. Charles F. Mitchell, Dr. Francis R. Packard, Dr. Arthur H. Gorhard, Dr. John Bernard Flick, Dr. Henry K. Dillard and Dr. William Drayton. Dr. William Taylor and his two sons as assistants have also joined the unit, as has Dr. Charles S. Jack, Young Doctor Flick, who is a son of Doctor Flick, the tuberculosis specialist, was married only last Thursday to Ardis Tangany.

So, with a personnel of some two hundred and fifty the "Pennsylvania Base Hospital" will start for "somewhere in France" very shortly. May they arrive safe and sound, with their wonderful, thoroughly equipped hospital!

Incidentally, do you know what a base hospital means? Well, it means 500 beds, seven or eight portable hospital wards, surgeons, practitioners, nurses and about two hundred assistants, all sorts and kinds of bandages, surgical dressings, bed clothes, garments, pillows, splints, needles, surgical instruments of all kinds, everything possible to think of. And I'm sure the poor sick soldiers who are actually wanting for medical attention and care will welcome them with open arms. It's a great work and the hospital should be congratulated that it is the first in this State called upon to send its unit.

IN SPITE of the war, there is still a good bit going on about us, and the golf craze is as great as ever. I stopped in at the Country Club for tea on Sunday, and you never have seen so many people as had motored out there in spite of the really disagreeable and damp weather, and the course was crowded. The Victor Mothers were there, of course. I looked for Gladys Eadie and Gilbert Mather, but if they had been there earlier they were not about when I arrived. Mrs. Mather looked stunning, and is very much pleased that her little sister has fallen in love with her brother-in-law, for she is a very happy woman herself, and doubtless thinks the Mather make good husbands.

Jean Lillie and Theodora were with the Mather. Jean was being wished happiness on every side. The Lillie girls are very popular and exceedingly pretty. They tell me that Lieutenant Wiley is very attractive and that she is supremely happy, and again I am so glad. Aren't you?
