

Shipping Loss Decreases, Admiralty Will Report

LONDON, May 9.

A SUBSTANTIAL decrease in the number of sinkings by subma-rines in the last week will be shown in the forthcoming weekly report of shipping losses. In fact, it is stated, the report will show the smallest losses in the last three weeks. No reason for this is given out by officials, but its plainly intimated that considerable progress has been made in the anti-submarine cam-paign. There is no guaranty that the weekly large will not avoid that paign. There is no guaranty that the weekly losses will not again assume alarming proportions, but the fact that they have been substan-tially reduced is very encouraging to those in charge of the campaign, and it is believed that the new measures to combat the underwater craft are already showing gratifying results.

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
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
