France, indeed, would like to live in peace and with the love of mankind in her heart, but at all times the sons of France have been willing and ready to spend their blood for a noble ideal.

JOFFRE'S SPEECH BRIEF
Marshal Joffre was introduced as a man who spoke in words of cannon and powder. His address was brief. He said that both he and Monsieur Viviani had been overwhelmed with the welcome they received. He spoke of the gigantic struggle which has been going on in Europe and told how the Allies in the trenches would welcome the Stars and Stripes.
"Undivided" one and all, we shall crush despotism and barbarism from this world. "With that as my hope, and nothing but the truth and gratitude for the wonderful reception in my heart, allow me the honor of drinking to the health of the great leader of this nation, President Woodrow Wilson."
More than 700 men and women stood to their feet cheering, applauding and waving napkins, small flags, even handkerchiefs madly as the former Premier resumed his seat.
