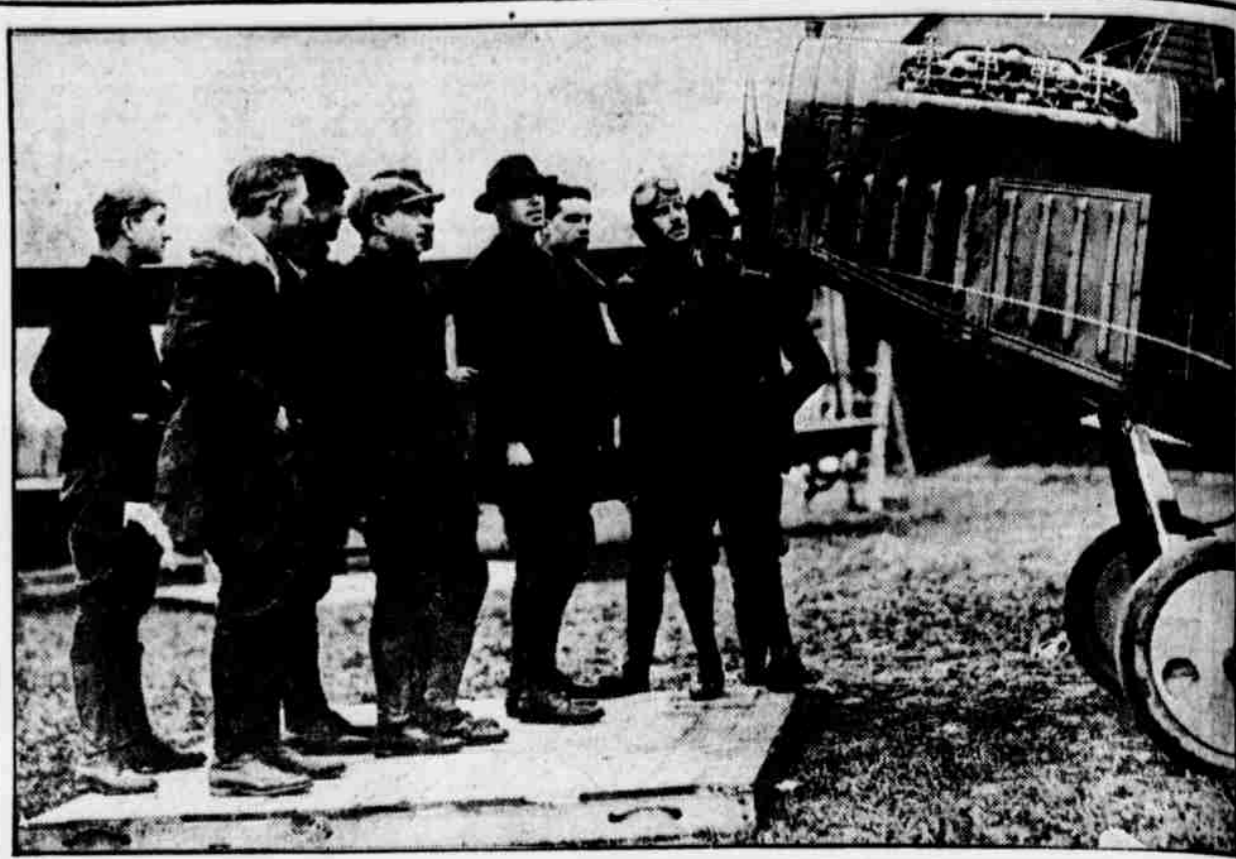


DARING EXPLOITS OF AMERICAN AVIATORS IN FRANCE ATTRACT COLLEGE MEN TO THE AIR



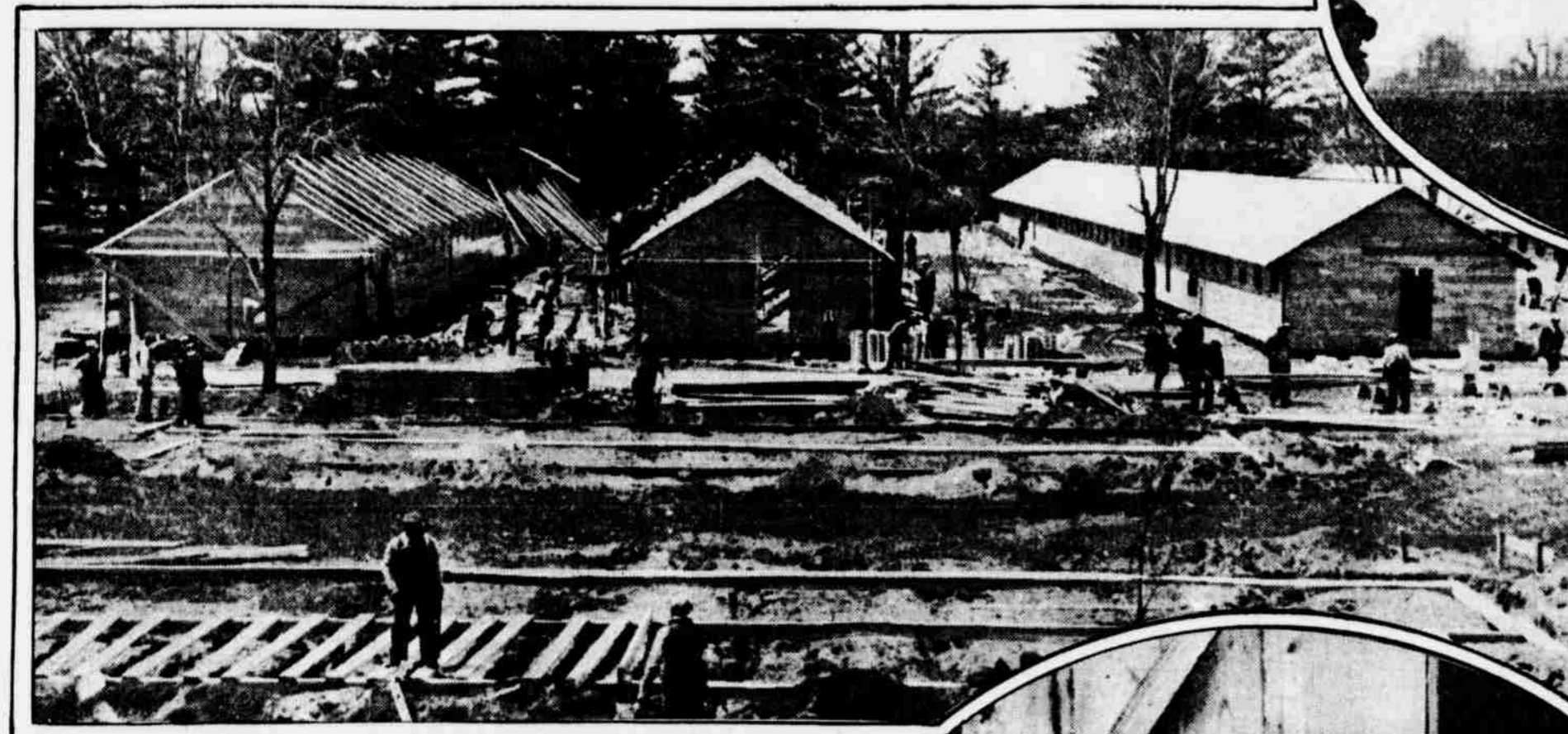
PRINCETON STUDENTS TAKE LESSONS IN THE HAZARDOUS ART OF FLYING

Lieutenant J. C. Colgan, U. S. A., is explaining their use to Princeton aviators.



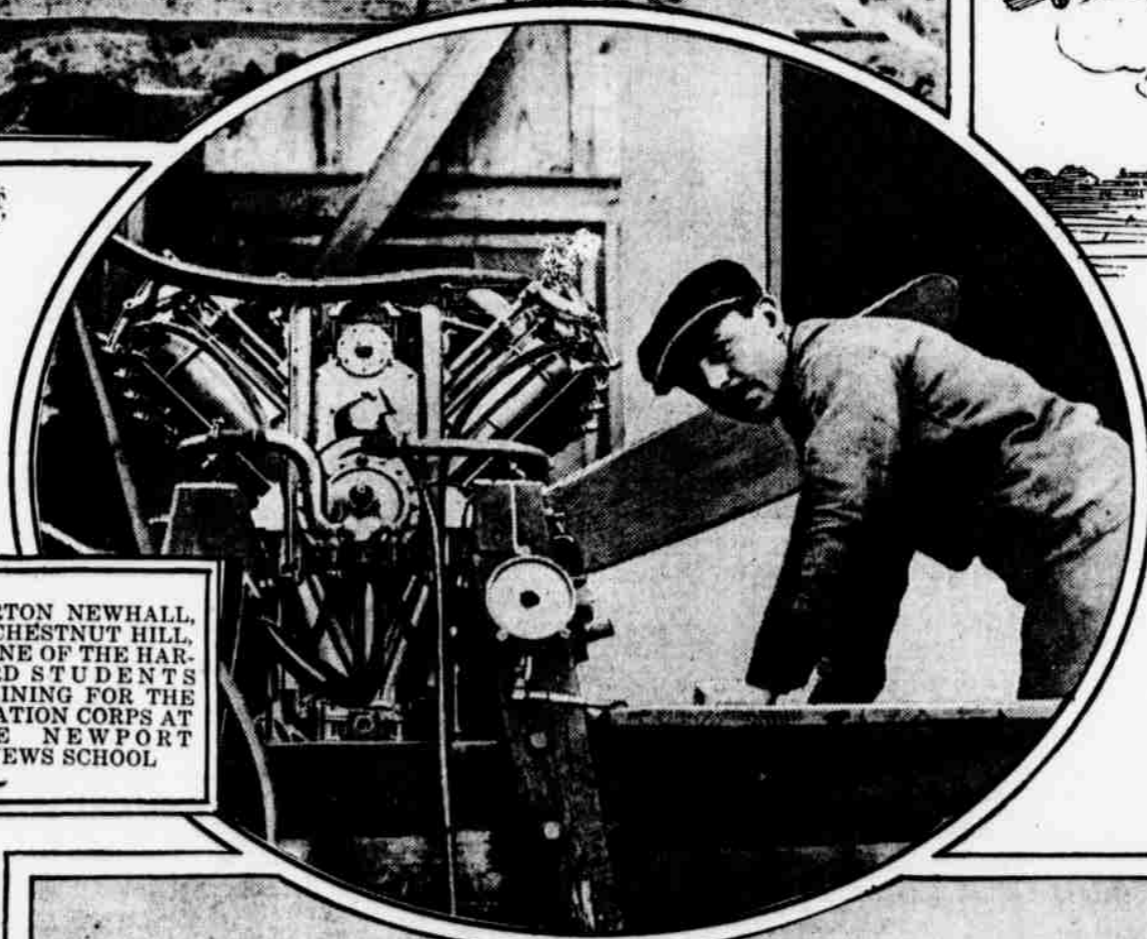
