Recruiting, fluctuating like a pulse, beat hard today in a boom that added more than sity men to the army before noon. This perfy equaled the total enlistments for the entire day yesterday.

The other branches of the service trailed behind the army in enlistments.

Assurance from the War Department came today that enlistments in the National Gurd are for the duration of the war only. A telegram from Governor's Island said that "men now enlisting or enlisted since the declaration of war in regiments, whether is the Federal service or not, may be assured that upon application they will be discharged at the termination of the war." Owing to the rush of its members to attend the officers' training camp at Fort Nisgars, the First City Troop has started a recruiting campaign to bring the troop up to its full strength of 150. Only six privates and the commissioned officers remain on the troop roll.


