ENGINEER UNIT GROWS

Active Steps to Organize Regiment of Shopmen for France Taken by Railroad Heads

Pennsylvania led in recruiting for the regular army yesterday, according to a War Department announcement this afternoon.

Recruiting for the Philadelphia engineer reserve regiment that is to be sent to France approached the 400 mark today.

Notices posted by railroads asking their employees to enlist in the engineer unit brought many responses.

The railroads lying east of Pittsburgh, south of New York and north of Washington have agreed to recruit a regiment of 1000 enlisted men, who will form the Philadelphia or Ninth Engineer Reserve Regiment, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Herbert Deakins.

KOPP'S LICENSE PLEA VIGOROUSLY OPPOSED

Court Hears Remonstrance Against Permitting Saloon at 215 South Broad Street

Renewed efforts to prevent Daniel J. Kopp, whose hotel site at 46 North Broad street, was taken for the parkway, from getting a new location were made when Kopp's application came up before Judges Martin and Finletter in the Common Pleas Court today.

A large squad of business people from the neighborhood, including a delegation from the Walnut Street Business Association, appeared to back up remonstrances against locating Kopp's hotel there.

Charles Henry Fox, artist, and Miss Katherine Hoffmeister, a hairdresser, were the principal complainants against Kopp's application.

"Patrons of our shop are often bothered by the men who patronize other bars in the neighborhood," said Miss Hoffmeister.
