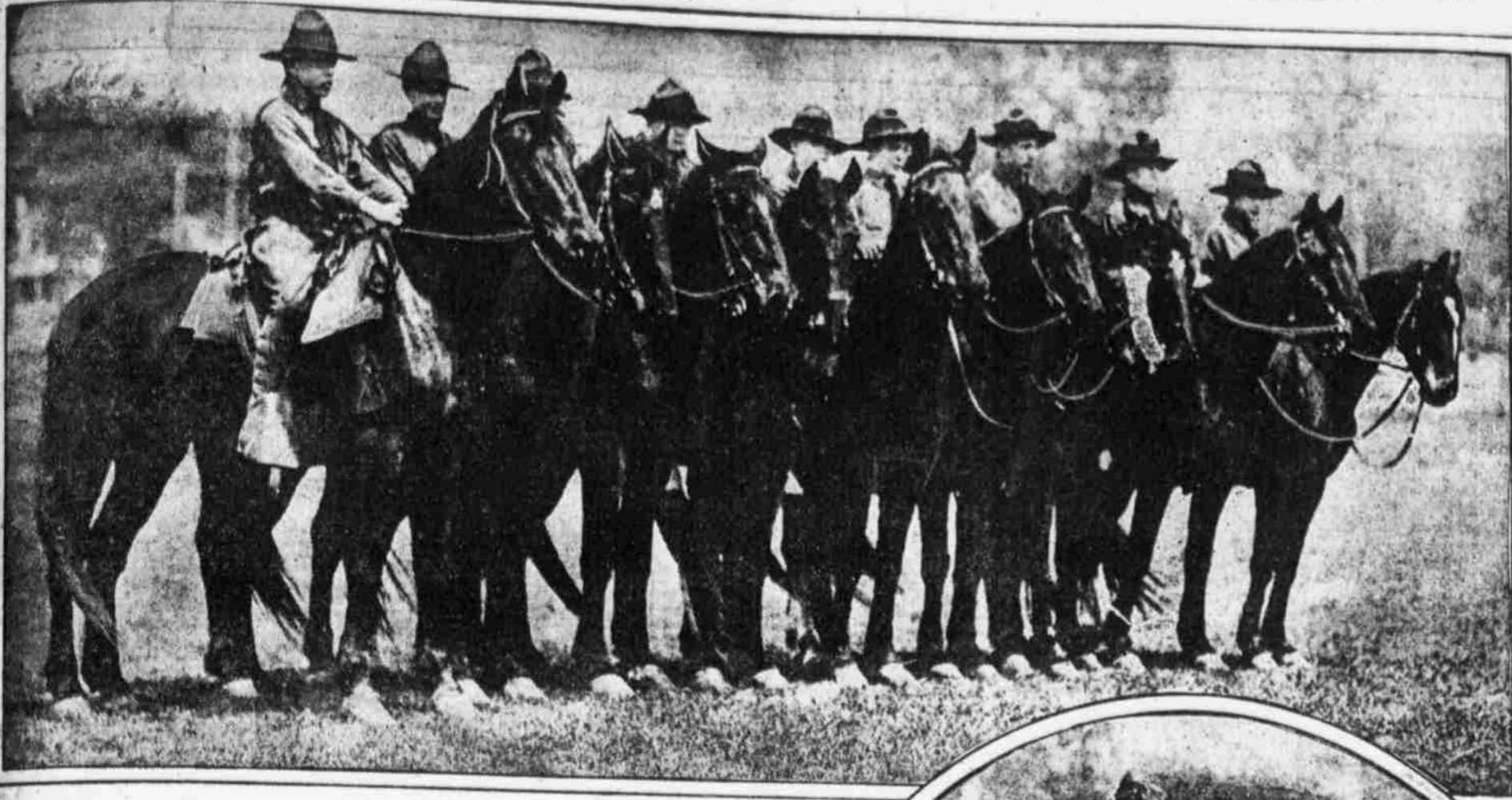


PHILADELPHIA AND ITS ENVIRONS FIGURE PROMINENTLY IN THE DAILY PHOTOGRAPHIC NEWS



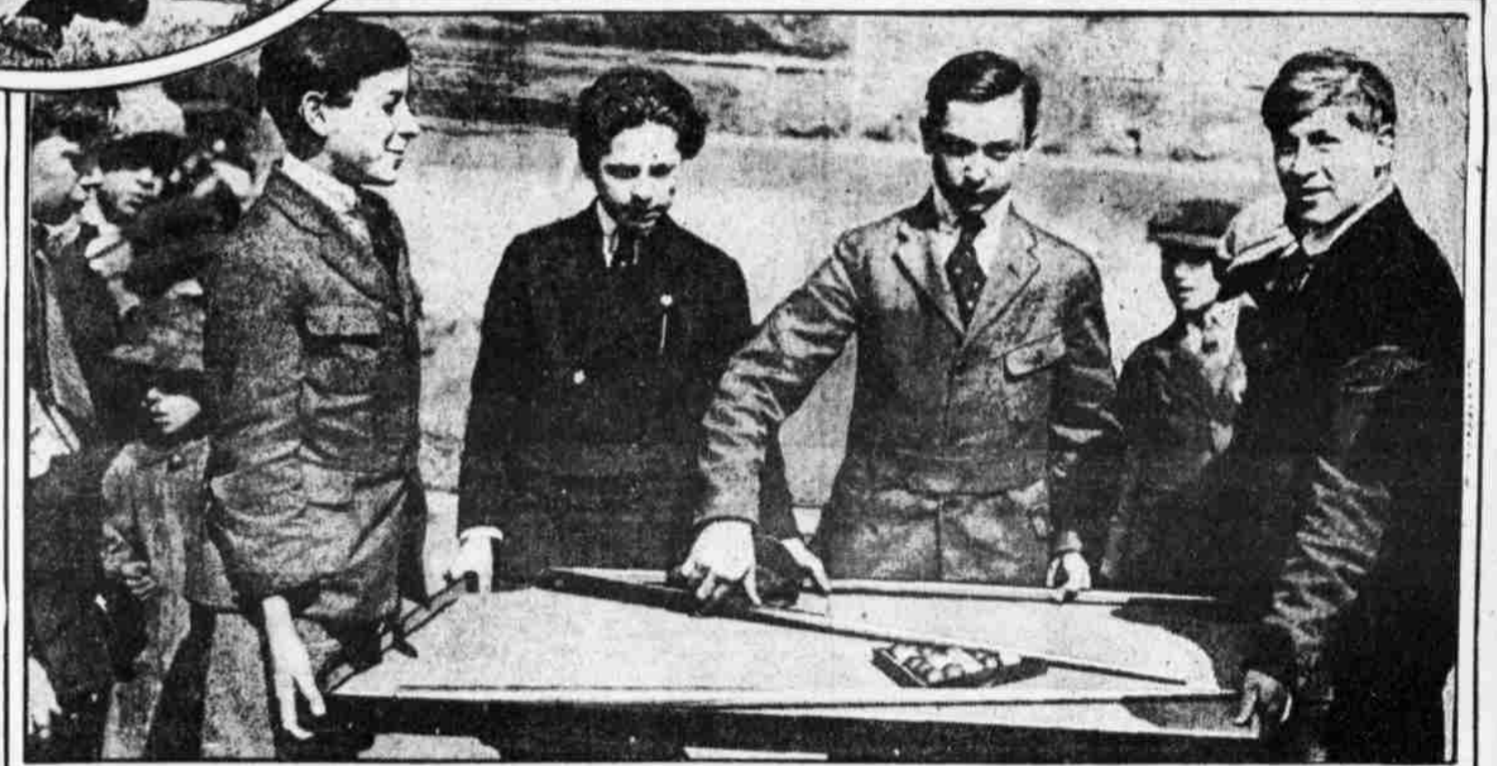
GOVERNMENT INSPECTOR KEEPS CHESTER CADETS ON THE JUMP
