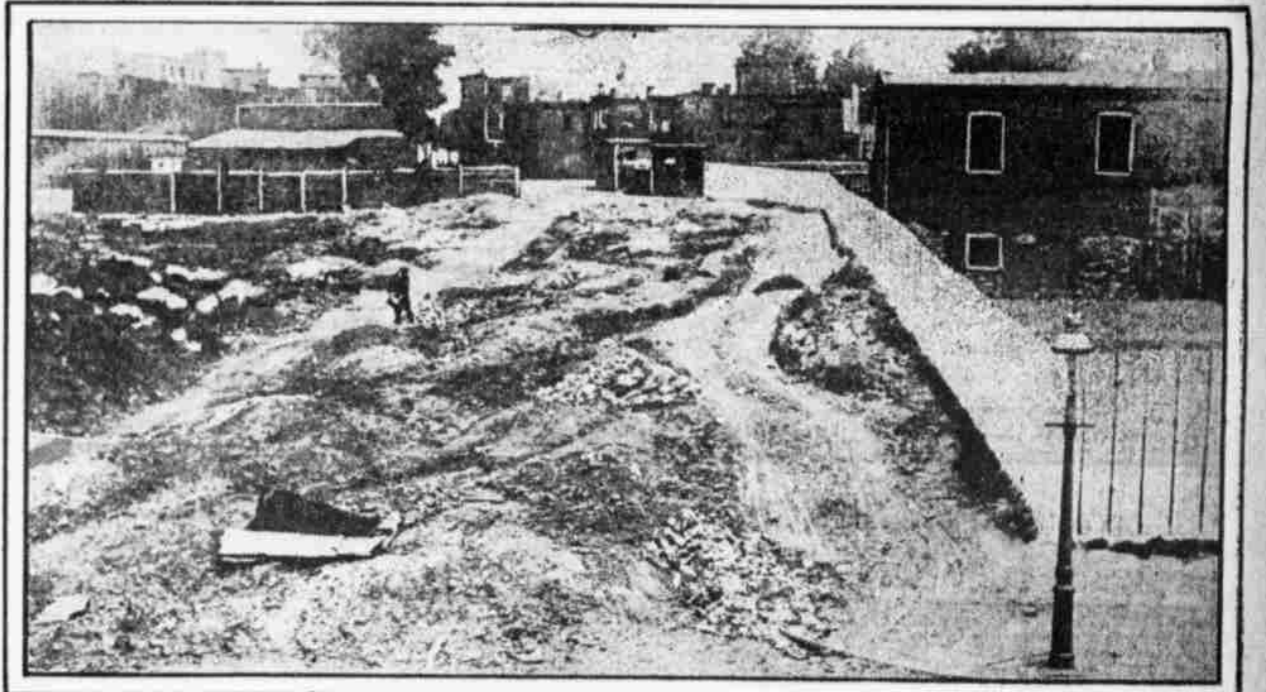
A MAN WHO RAISED EACH SON TO BE A SOLDIER

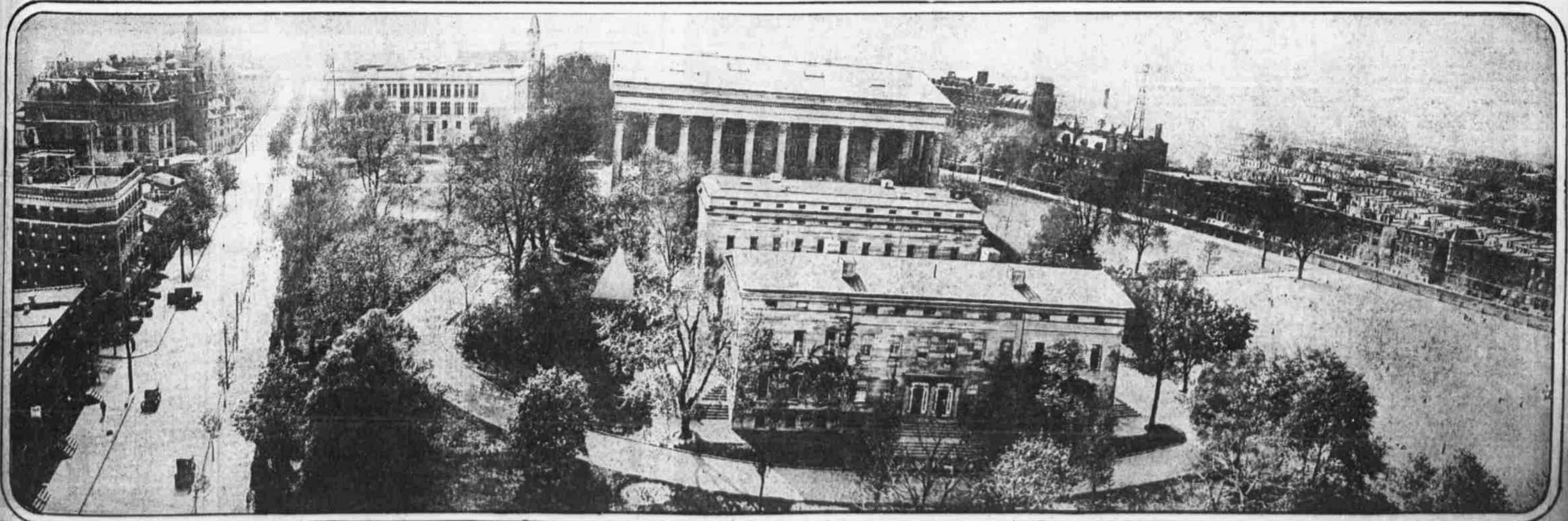
PHILADELPHIA CARES FOR TWO REAL WAR BABIES
