REGISTRATION day for selective draft, June 5, 7 a. m. to 7

Every male resident of United States who has reached twenty-first birthday and who has not reached thirty-first birthday on that date must register.

Travelers must mail cards home. Sick persons must register by proxy. Only men not required to register are members of army and navy and of State and reserve organizations in actual Federal service.
