

When the order came to charge, Barrett was among the first to go over the parapet. The legionaires stormed forward amid a storm of shot and shell. But the ranks hever faitered and through the bursting bombs, the crashing shells, the sweeping machine gun sprays and the shrapnel, they teadily advanced until they were in the Germans' first-line trenches. Barrett fell with a builet through his leg. Just as he fell the Germans swept from their second-line trenches in a savage counter-attack.

The legionaires were forced to give up The regionaires were forced to give up Detr newly won sround and retire to their eld position. From their trenches comrades of the failen American saw him picked up and carried by the Germans into their sec-ond line.

Three hours later, the legion, re-enforced by another regiment, again attacked. This time the Germans were not only swept from their first-line trenches, but the second line to well.

In the second line trench the body of Barrett was found. A bayonet had been plunged through his heart.
