The young lady across the way says there ought to be no class distinctions in this country and she's sorry to see so much talk about the Government's taking over the common carriers and not a word about the Pullmans.

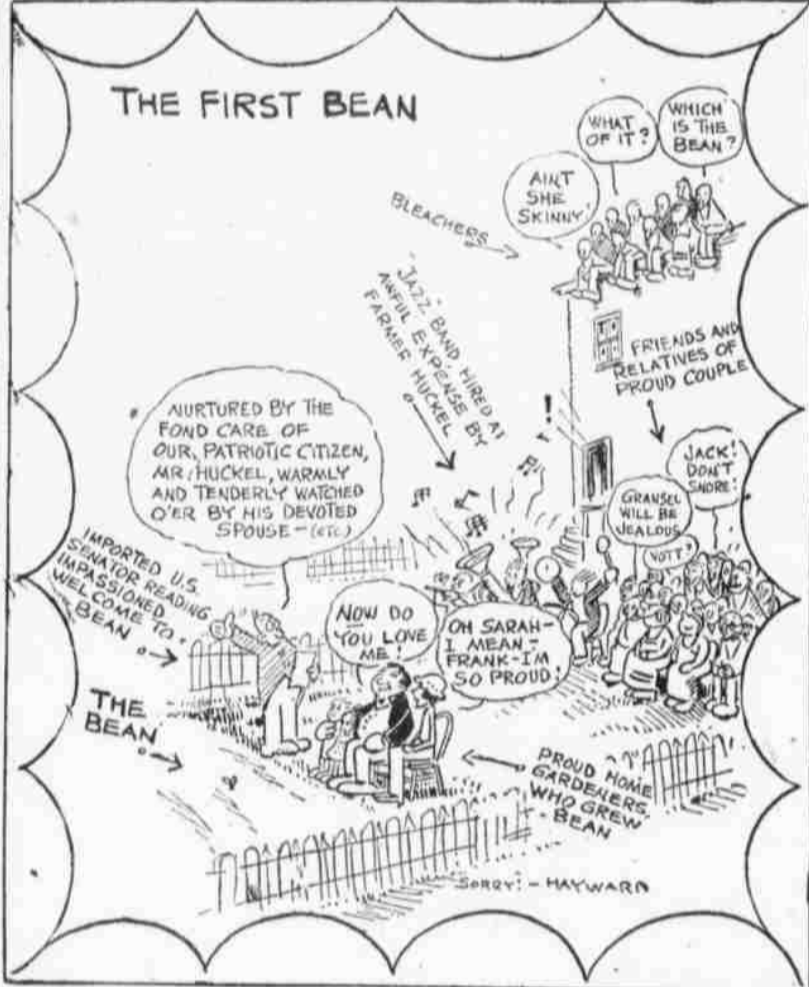
