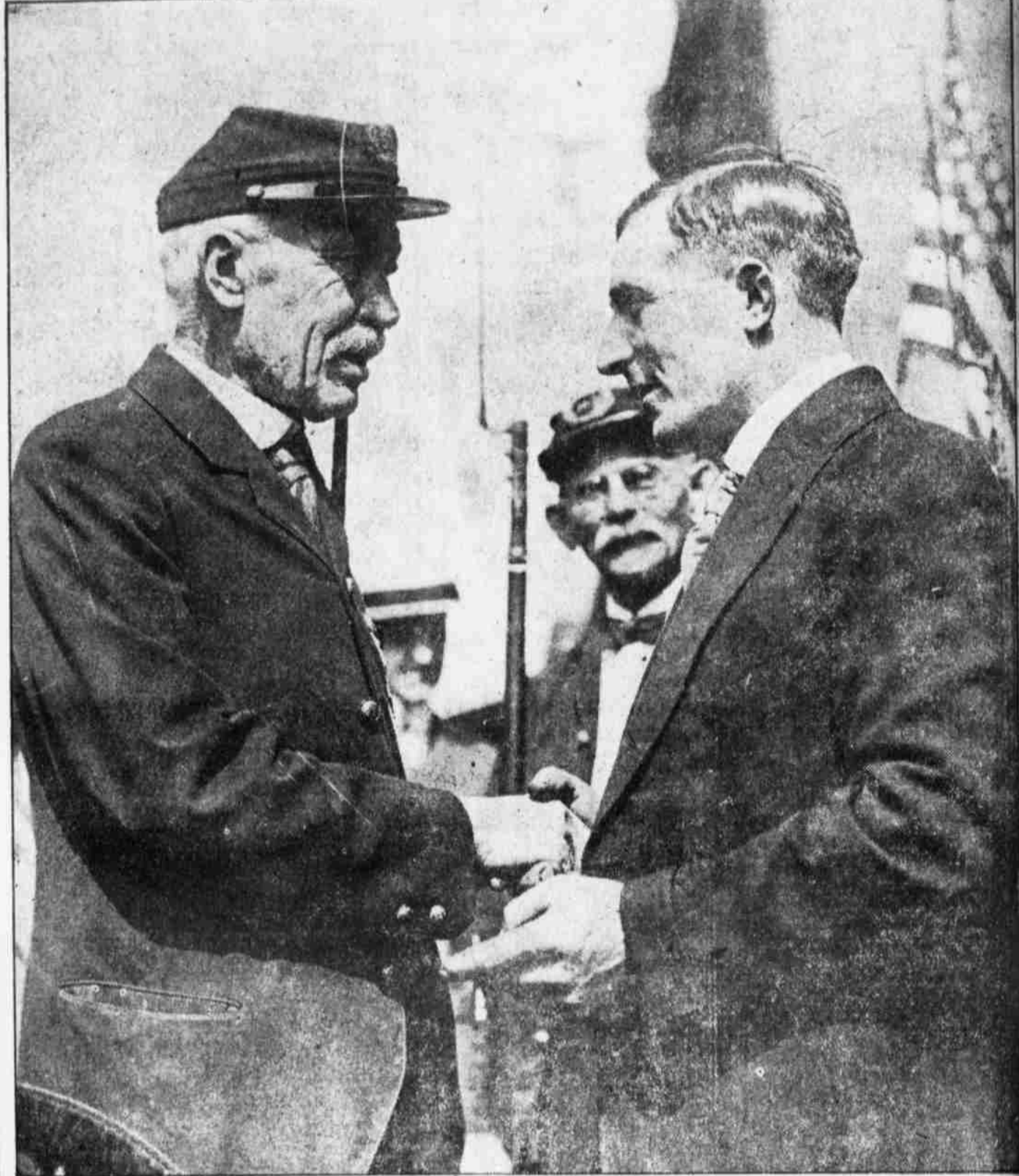


MEN OF '61 GREET BOYS OF '17

Nick Serreco has a broken arm, but he registered in the Fourth Ward and declared that he would be fit when the call came.



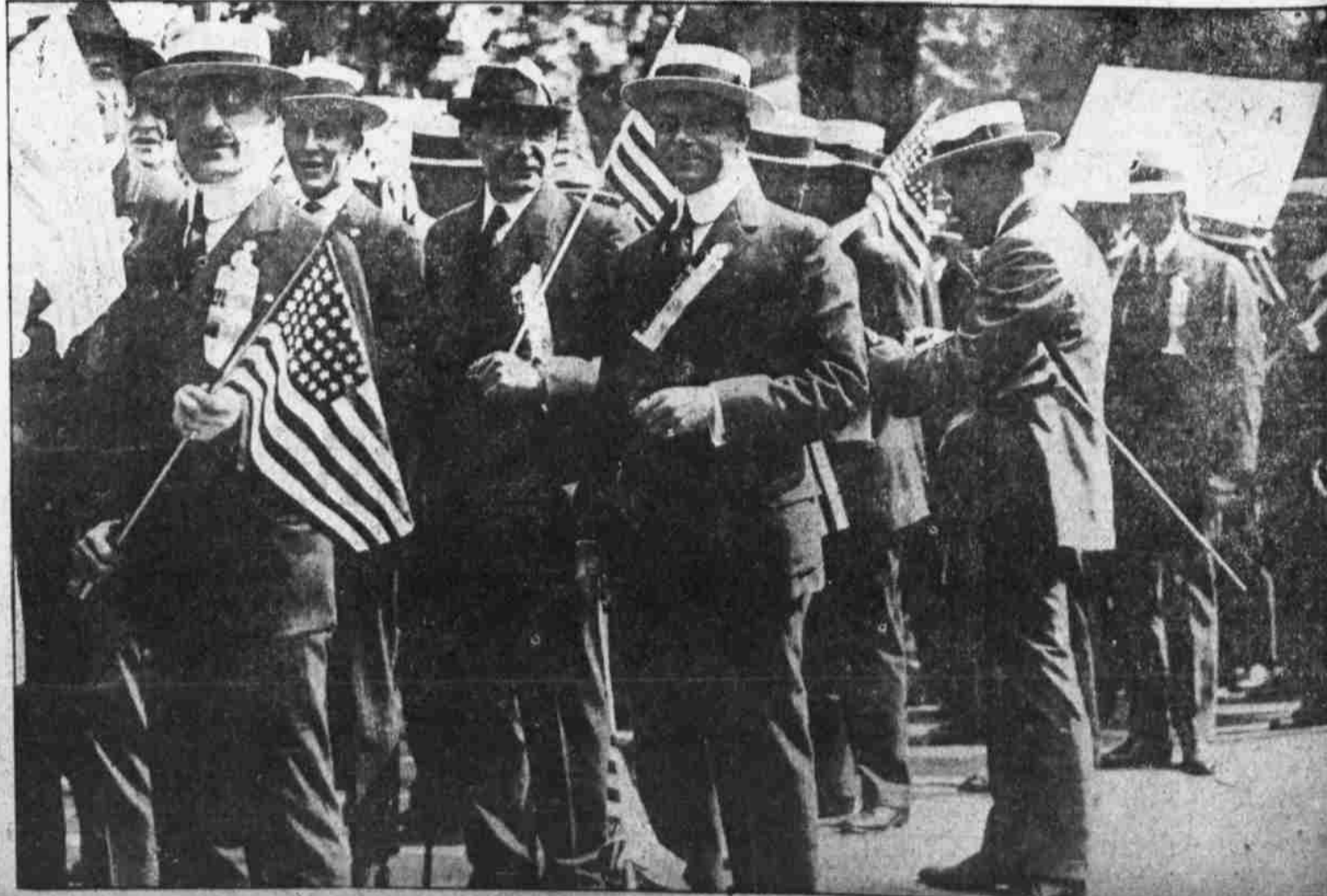
RITTENHOUSE SQUARE AND ENVIRONS FURNISHED THEIR QUOTA
