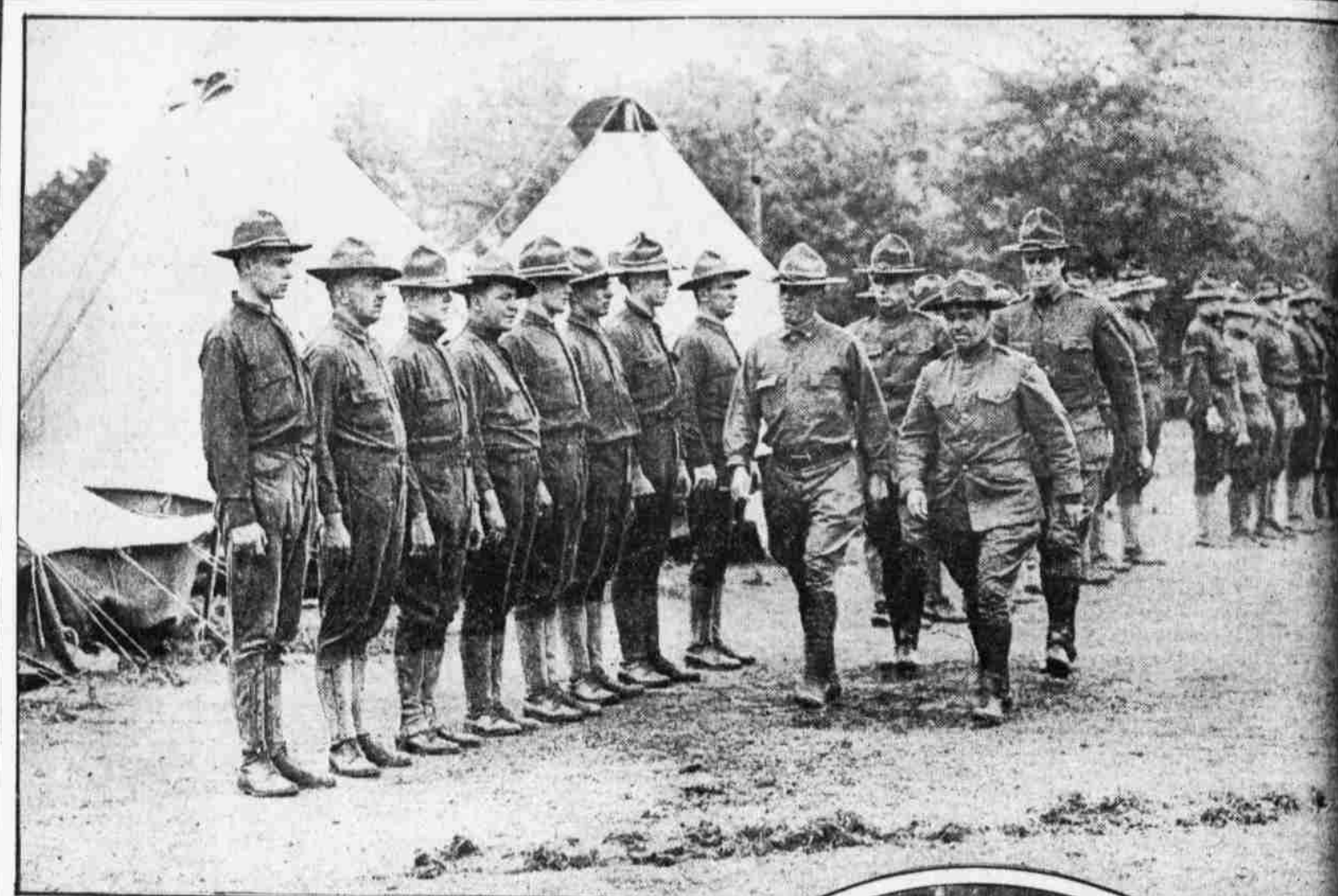
WARTIME SCENE IN CAMDEN

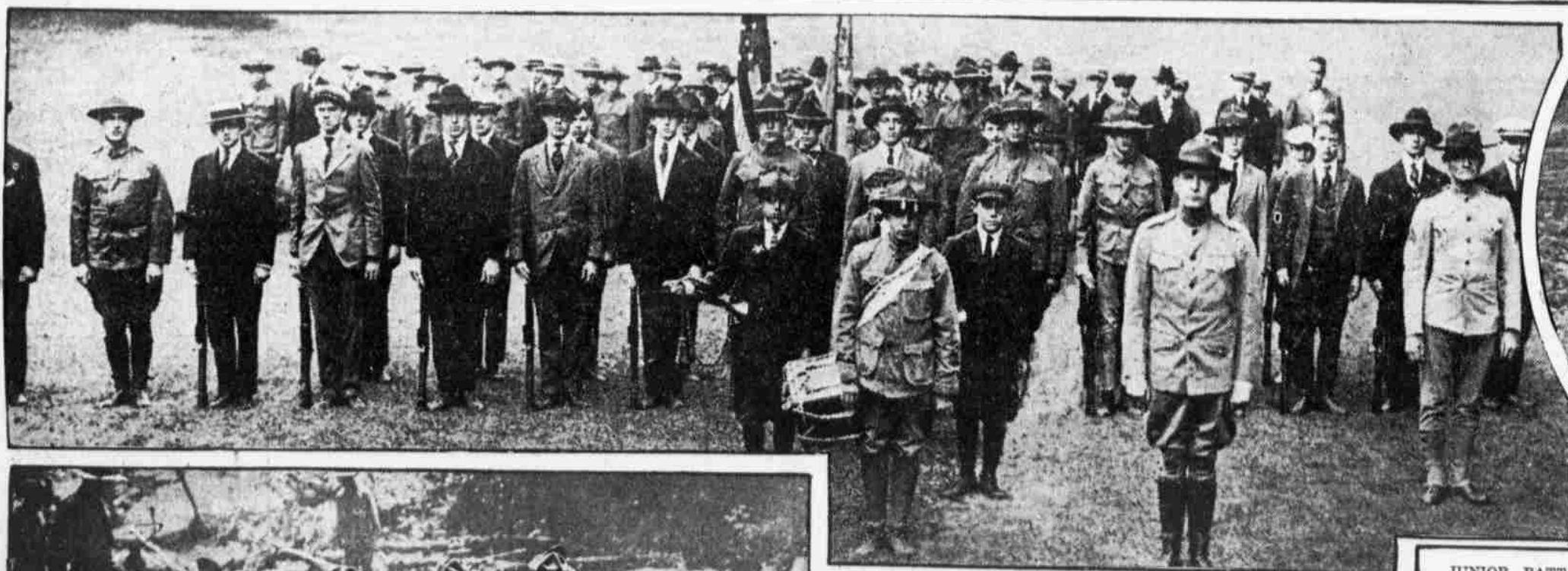


AT WORK IN THE TRENCHES IN CAMDEN

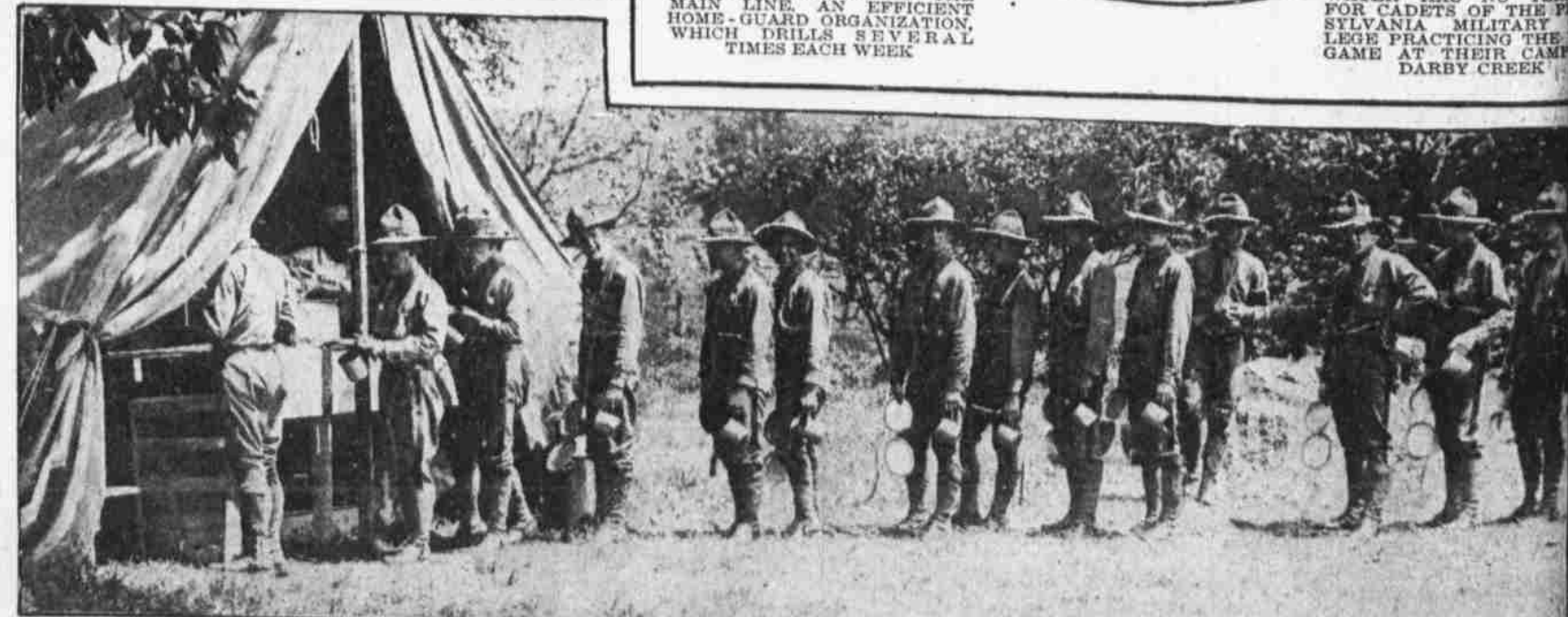
