TURNIPS AND CARROTS A. M. D. . . . BOTH EARLY AND LATE CROP

Spring Planting Now More in Favor Than Some Years Ago-Improved Varieties-What Kinds Home Gardener Should Grow-Suggestions for Sowing and Culture

FTURNIPS are carrots are among the root crops which every home gardener should plant, especially for fail and winter storing. An old farm rhyme runs:

On the fourteenth day of July. Plant your turning, wet or dry. However, the author of Glis ancient ditty res probably unawars of the advantages f spring sowing. There are both field (or stock) and gar-

dan turnipa. The latter are divided into the turnip proper, or white heshed, and rutabaga, or yellow fleshed. Strictly the rutabagan belong only to the Swedish group of the family

of the family. White turning are usually grown for nummer use, yellow for winter keeping.

CULTURE OF TURNIPS

In fact, turnips can be sown early, as poon as the soil is ready for any crop. Preferably wait for a wet day, as damp ground makes the turnip seed sprout well. Tround makes the turnip seed sprout well. Turnips are one of the easiest of all parden crops to grow, and they produce abundantly for each square foot of area devoted to them. Give turnips a moist soil and cool weather in the spring and they will mature in about sixty days or earlier. The faster they grow and the more luxuriant their top leaves the better they are; there-fore, it is well to plant spring turnips in fich soil. If they grow slowly they tend to soll. If they grow slowly they tend to me woody and bitter,

Because turnips need moisture it fol-hows that they need frequent cultivation, for much hoeing makes the surface of the ground a dust mulch, which saves the moisture in the ground from drying out.

Turpip rows, even in a back-yard garden where space is limited, should be fifteen to sixteen inches apart to allow the top follage to spread out and still leave room for cultivation. A half ounce of need will plant 100 feet of row. Smed a half-inch deep. Because of the tendency of spring turnips to lose quality in warm weather it is well to plant only a small portion of the total bed at once, planting again at inter-

When plants are well up, thin them, so that they stand three or four inches apart. Good varieties are white snowball, an extra early white fieshed; yellow-top globe, purple-top strap leaved (a rutabaga), Yel-low Aberdeen is a very sweet rutabaga; yellow fieshed, and excellent for storing, CULTURE OF CARROTS

a stiff, packed subsoli a few inches down it cannot penetrate this, and the root will sither split or become otherwise forked or gnaried. Soil that has been well dug, however, a foot or more deep, enables the carrot to grow shapely roots

carrot to grow shapely roots. The carrot is an early crop and easily grown after it gets started. Carrot meeds are small, and young plants are weak, so seeds should not be planted deeply, a haif inch being enough. It is mecessary to keep a dirt crust from forming over the words after they are minited hence it is seeds after they are planted, hence it is desirable to mix a few radiah seeds in with the carrot seeds. The radiahes grow quickly and sturdily, and not only mark the rows so that the home gardener can go over them with a garden rake and break any crust, but also aid in breaking the crust and letting the tender carrot shoots come

and letting the tender carrot shoots come through. One conce of carrot seed is enough to sow 100 feet of row. Seed should be sown rather thickly. After plants come up thin-ning by pulling out plants is not necessary unless they are crowding each other. Small carrols have beiter flavor than large mas carrots have better flavor than large ones. so that they can grow alk or seven to the foot in the row without injury. Make the rows a foot or even two feet apart. The carrot is a slow grower, maturing in

eight or ten weeks after planting. A con-tinuous supply can be insured by making new planting every three weeks or late as August 10, although in hot, dry weather the young plants must be watered by a thorough soaking twice a week. Recommended sorts to plant are Early
