METROPOLITAN LEASED TO DRAMATIC SPECTACLE

"The Wanderer" Opens September 24. House to Continue as Legitimate Theatre

Gest is pretty well known in Philadelphia of this time. It was his firm that kept "Exprisace" at the Adelphi for five months. It was the same firm that made "Very Good-Eddie" a long-run proposition in a city sightly hostile to long runs hitherto. Mor-ries latest coup is the leaning of the Metro-politan for two years.
