

# BIG TANKER LAUNCHED AT CRAMPS' SHIPYARD

Wife of Herbert G. Wylie, Manager of Petroleum Transport Company, Christens Craft

River craft of all descriptions shricked a warm greeting to the steamship William Green as it sped down the ways just be-fore noon today at Cramp's shipyard.

Colors of all nations mingled with the generous sunshine supplied by the weather man and an emphatic air of patriotism marked the proceedings.

The ship is one of a fleet of the Petroleum Transport Company, a subsidiary of the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport Company. As it started toward the river, Mrs. Herbert G. Wylle, wife of a vice preni-dent and the general manager of the company, crushed a bottle of champagne on the

The craft is 446 feet long, fifty-eight feet beam and will have a speed of eleven knots. The depth of the main deck is twenty-five teet four inches, and it has a carrying capacity of 10,000 tons. The hull is of steel throughout. The propelling machinery a vertical inverted triple expansion engine, so arranged that either coal or oil may be used.

The ship will ply between Tampico. Mex-co, and North American ports.
