NEW YORK, June 18.

There were many developments over Sunday of a character to unsettle peculative sentiment and induce fresh bearish activities on the Stock Exchange. These developments included the cable reports of Japanese opposition to the Taited étates' diplomatic move in China, the Washington advices of a new excess ex proposition and the position taken by the Naval Construction Board, apparently requiring a marked reduction in the price of steel on Government contracts. For a good part of the day underlying strength maintained prices of many

taues at or above Saturday's final range, and some stocks made substantial gains in the first hour of trading, but later in the day the entire speculative situation was dominated by the development of increased stringency in the money market. There was an absence of offerings of time money, and call money, which was in scant supply, was quoted at 6 per cent all through the day on the floor of the Stock Exchange. The statement was made by bank representatives that this position resulted from the fact that during the last week the Government had uken \$170,000,000 cash from the banks and so far has not replaced any of it, se it was expected would be done.

It was insisted that stringency must continue until the Administration takes some steps to return cash to the banks and permit the maintenance of substantial

United States Steel common indicated the movements in the entire market to a fair degree. That stock early in the afternoon was down to 127%, against III at the close on Saturday, and Bethlehem Steel "B" declined to 1411/2, against 148% at the close on Saturday. Other industrials generally showed losses ranging from 2 to more than 4 points. Railway issues like Pittsburgh and West Virginia and Reading, which had showed strength recently, were also weak and declined from 1 to 3 points. A decline was in order at the close.

Business in the bond market was small in volume, with some of the railway baues in supply at concessions. The Rock Island 5s sold off from 74 to 73%, and concessions were noted in the foreign issues.

### CURB MARKET ACTIVE AND STRONG ON BEAR FACTORS OF EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, June 18.

Activity and strength were shown in many issues on the Broad Street Curb without regard to the unsettling influence which depressed prices on the Stock Exchange. The very factors that worked for a lower market on the big board had an opposite influence on many of the Curb stocks, several of those issues being in demand because of knowledge of coming Government expenditures.

This was the case especially with Wright-Martin Aircraft, which was in urgent demand because of reports of July contracts made by France and our own Government. The sales of that stock amounted to more than 50,000 shares, with opening transactions at 9 to 101/2, followed by a reaction to 8%.

The entrance into the dyestuff industry of American capital made Eastern Aniline continue a strong feature, with knowledge of the placing of its product far in advance inducing a good deal of investment buying.
