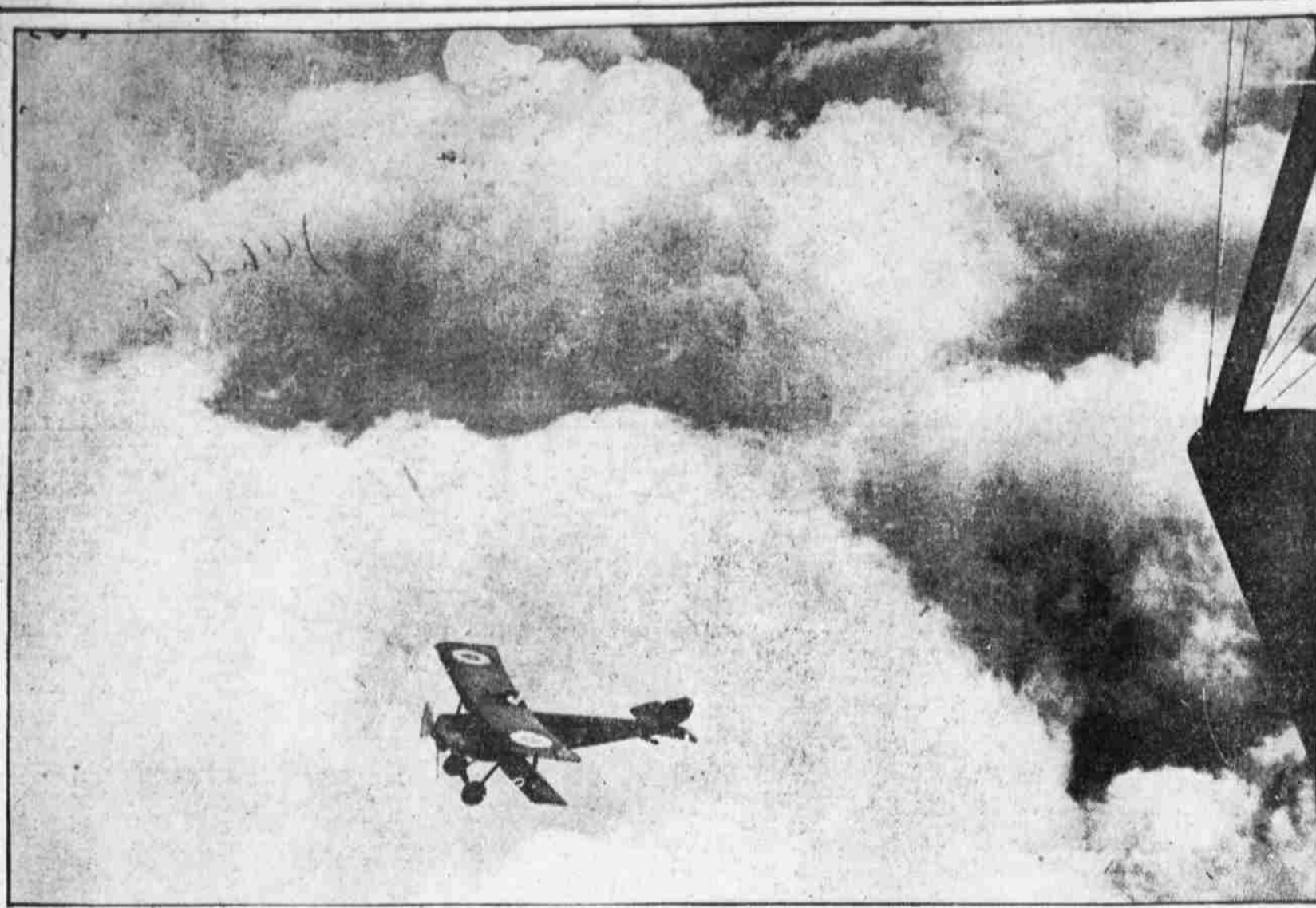
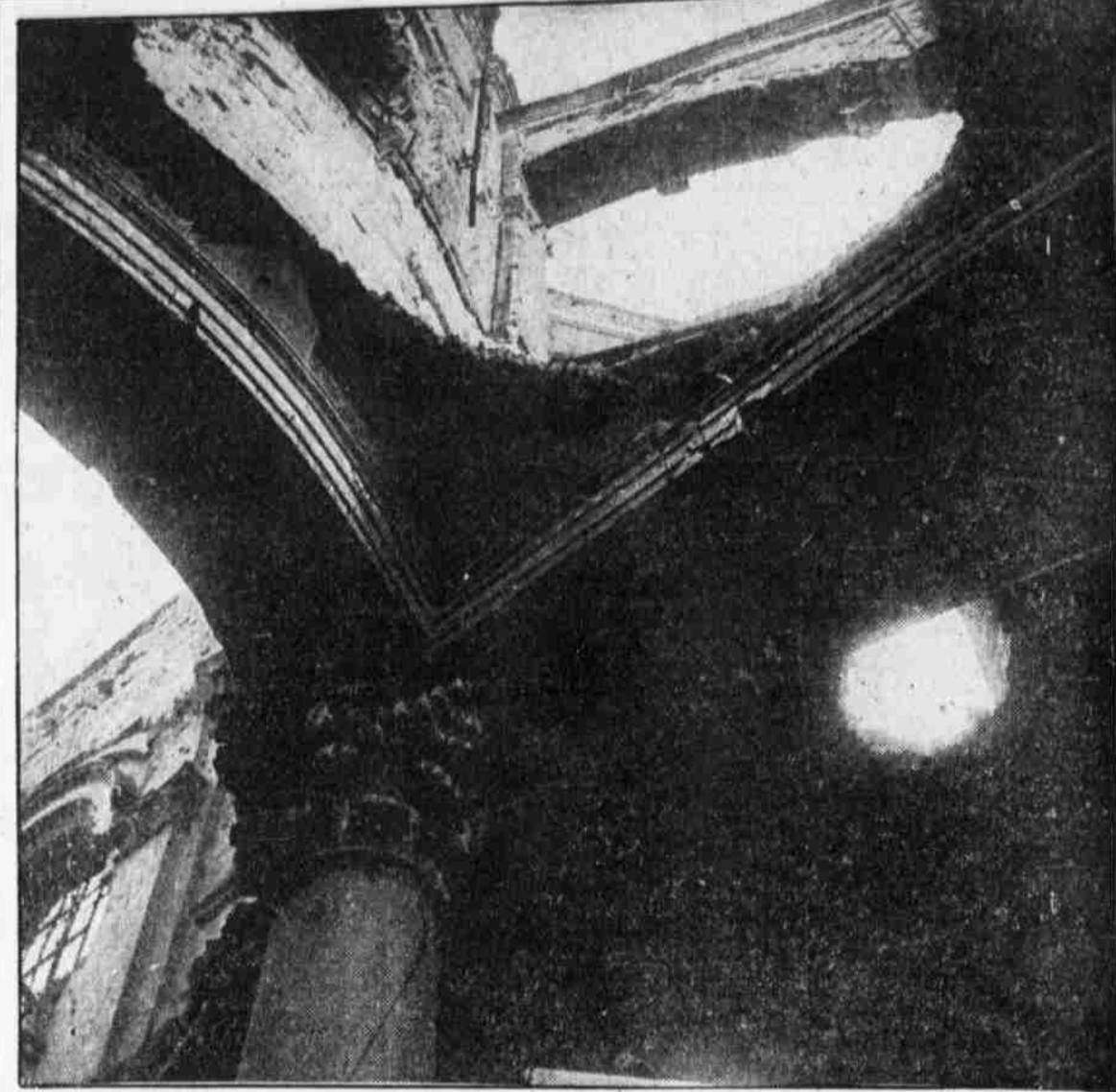


THE WAR FURNISHES A NEVER-ENDING STREAM OF PICTURES FROM NEARBY AND AFAR

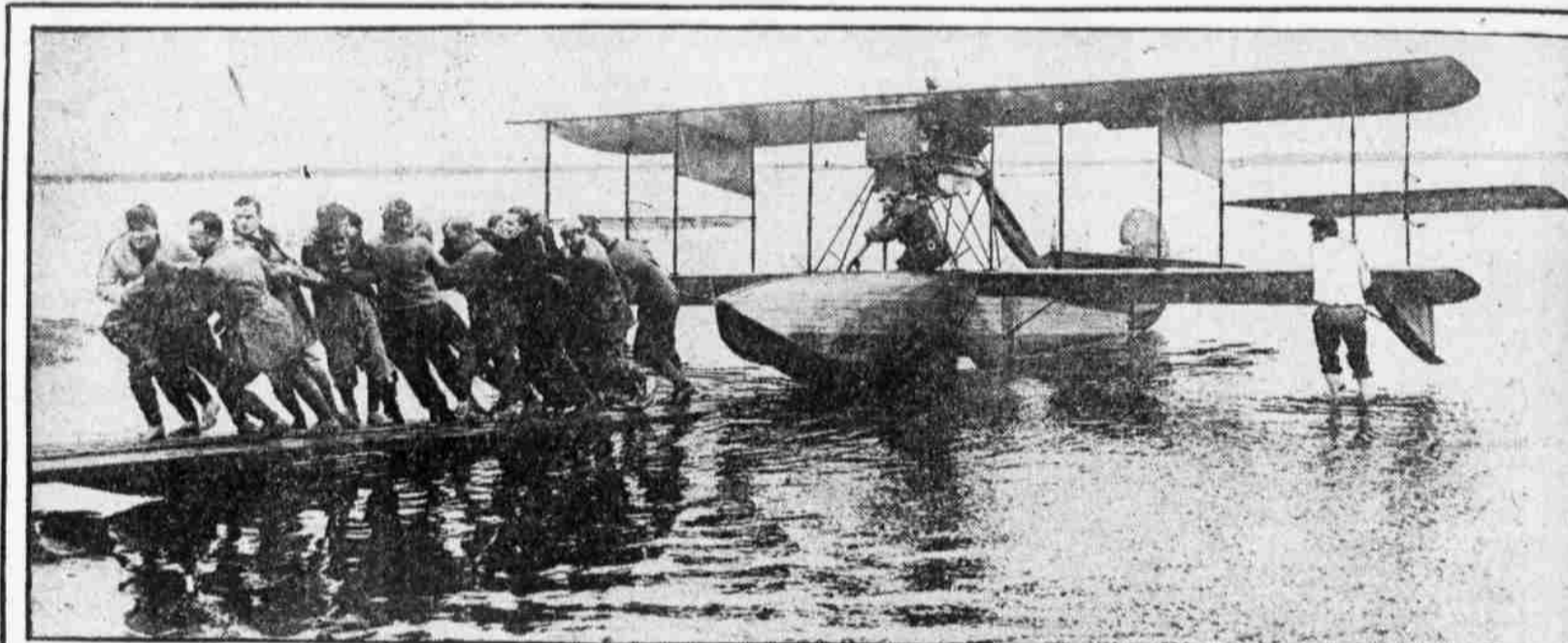

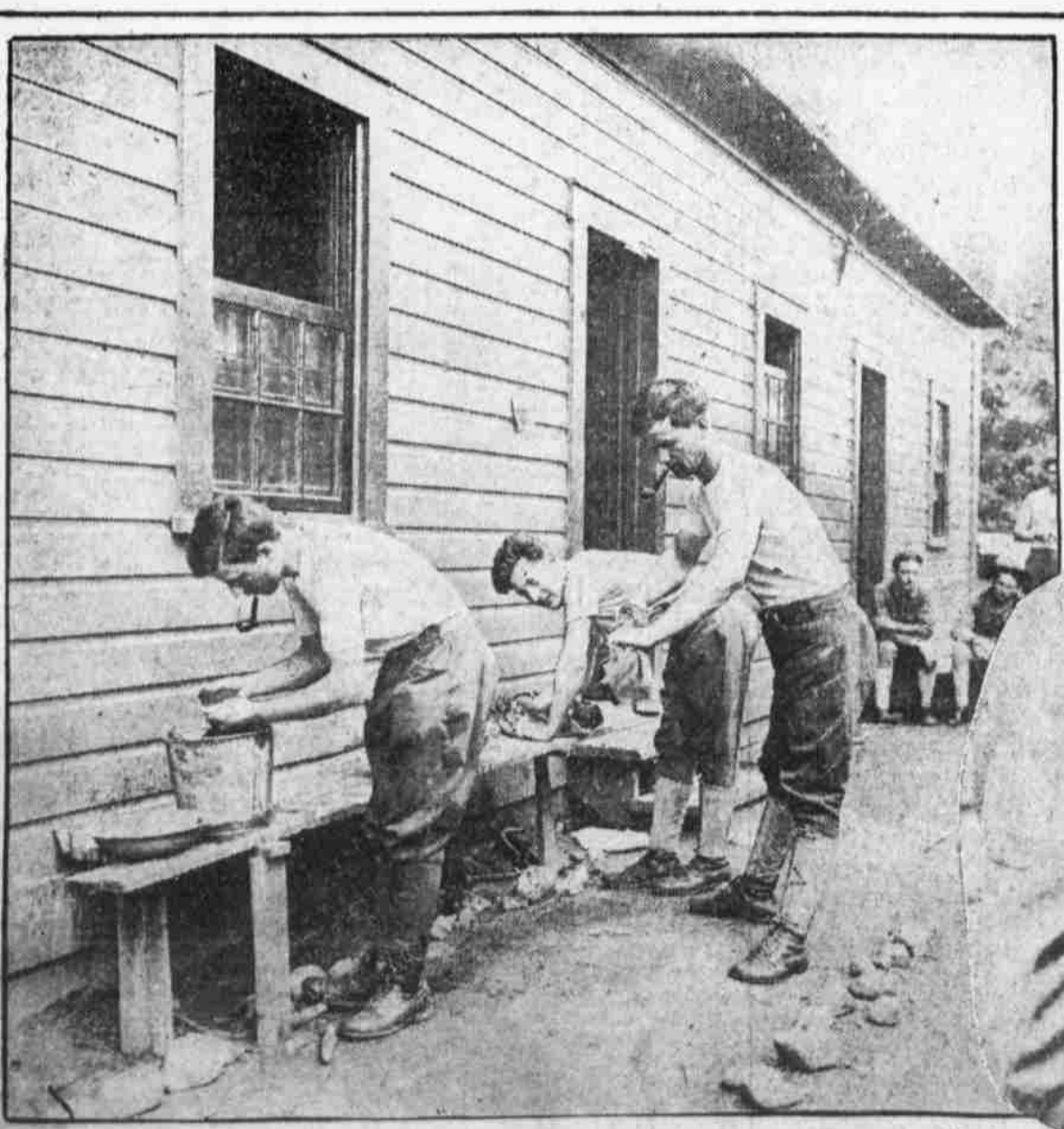


YOUNG COLLEGE MEN IN TRAINING FOR UNCLE SAM'S GREAT AVIATION CORPS
