NO REASON FOR COAL PRICE RAISE, HE SAYS

Witness Tells of Advance Made as Result of Operators' Meeting Last January

NEW YORK, June 25.

The famous meeting of coal operators at the Waldorf-Astoria January 3 last was delved into at length today in the Government's Sherman law prosecution of fifty-one coal companies. W. R. J. Zimmermann on the stand declared there was no reason for the increase in coal adopted to the wasting but he admitted that these at the meeting, but he admitted that those present talked about the necessity for in-creased rates and mentioned minimum figres which some of the speakers suggested.

Zimmermann also tes-tified regarding a price list circulated among the coal operators, suggesting \$2 per ton as the minimum rate for coal at the mines.
