

ARCANUM SUSTAINED BY CIRCUIT COURT

Order for Receiver of Supreme Work of the Good of the Order Council Vacated on Clear and Sound Reasons

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals, in Boston, has vacated an order of the District Court in appointing Thomas J. Boynton temporary receiver of the supreme

Boynton temporary receiver of the supreme council, Royal Arcanum.

Application for the appointment of a receiver was made on behalf of Arthur L. Hobart, of Braintree, who as the holder of a nominal death benefit certificate alleged that the funds of the order had been improperly administered. Counsel for the organization on appeal denied the charge.

The Circuit Court of Appeals held that the lower court was without jurisdiction in appointing a receiver, inasmuch as the Royal Arcanum was a Massachusetts corporation and Hobert should have sought relief elsewhere.
