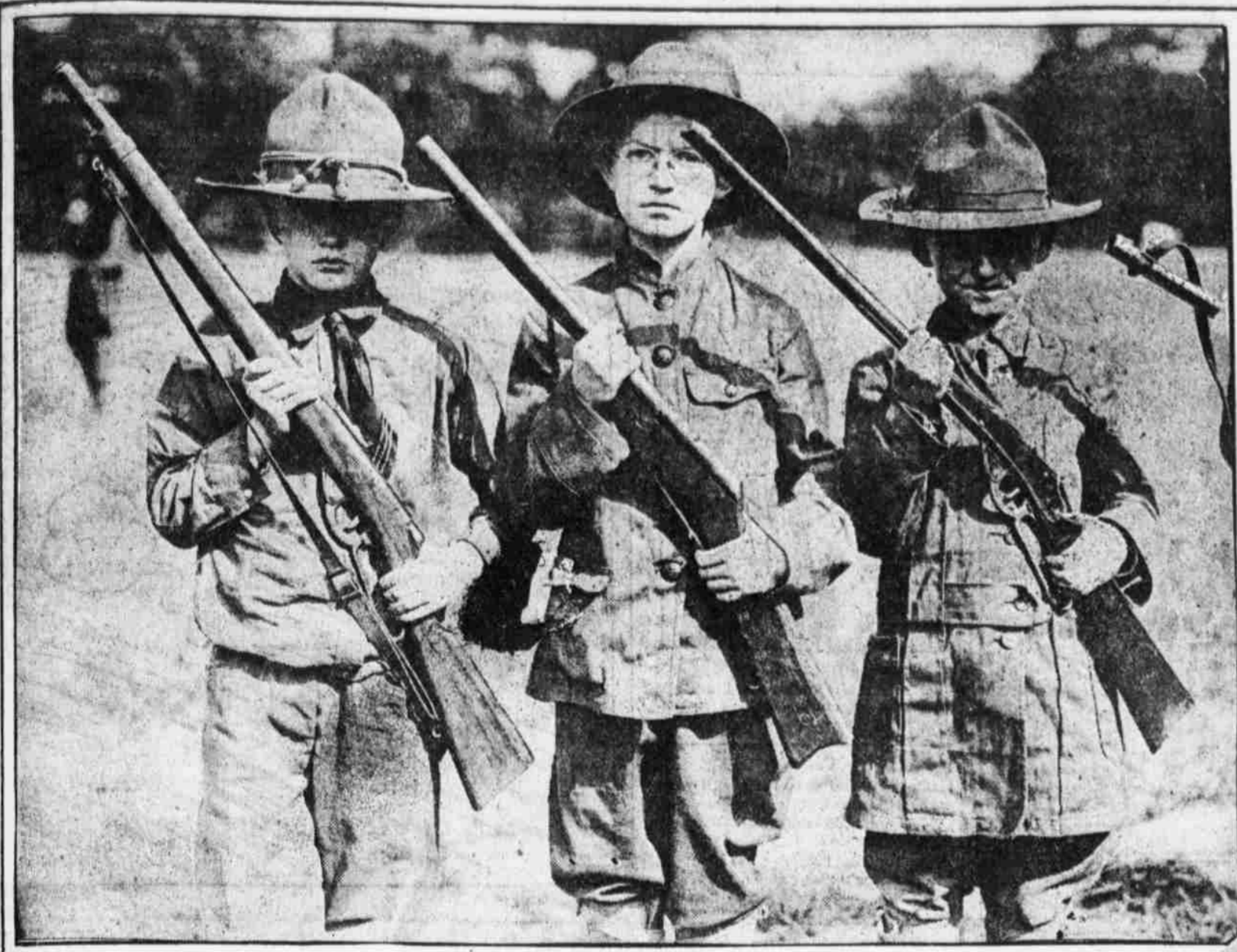
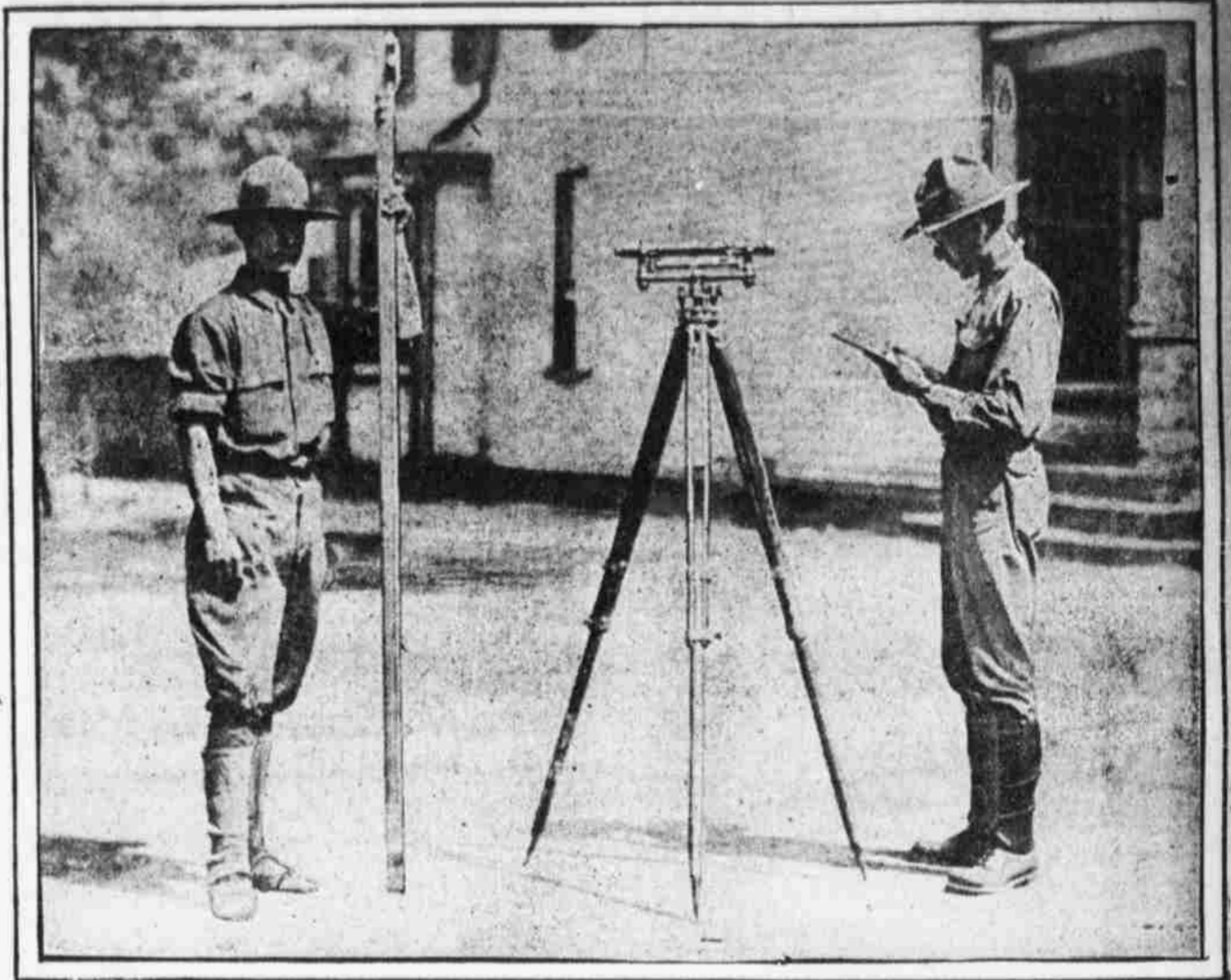

Types of uniforms and rifles used by the Boys' Brigades of Pennsylvania, as shown in the great review on Belmont plateau.



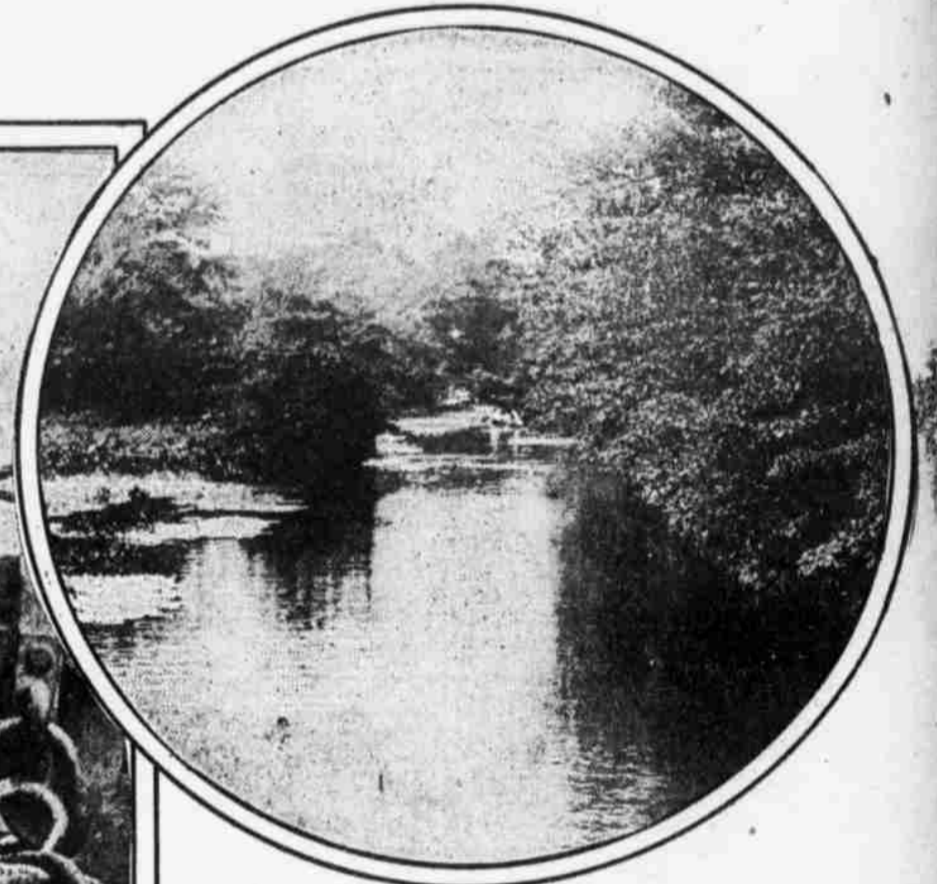
LAYING OUT THE GROUND PLAN FOR A VAST ARMY STATION
