CONTRACTS OF SUSPENDED MINORS TO BE PROTECTED

CHICAGO, June 29.—Minor leagues forced to suspend before the close of the regular season will not lose their players or territorial rights, according to a ruling of the governing board of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, received by President Barney, of the Three-I League, last night.

The ruling was issued by John H. Farrell, secretary of the National Association, as a result of an appeal from President Barney, who believes some of the smaller leagues will not survive the season, owing to the war situation and continued unfavorable weather.

The board ruled, however, that players will be permitted to seek employment wherever possible for the remainder of the season, but must report next spring to the club holding their contract this season.

The board also ruled that leagues desiring to suspend shall fix a date for closing and that all players must be paid in full.

BEDELL TO TRY FOR NEW RECORD
