

TIDEN TO OPPOSE OSBORNE IN FINAL

Germantown Player Favorite to Win From Belfield Star at Wilmington

START PLAY AT 3 P. M.

William T. Tilden, 34, of the Germantown Cricket Club, who needs no introduction to tennis players in the East, will clash with Percy S. Osborne, of the Belfield Country Club, in the final round of singles in the Delaware State tournament at the Wilmington Hotel.

With weather conditions favorable, the match will start promptly at 3 o'clock. Tilden, who has been playing phenomenal tennis of late, is a big favorite, but those who know Osborne and his game say he will give Tilden a battle.

TIDEN ERRS IN DOUBLES PLAY

Tilden and his young doubles partner, Beck, lost the final round of the Delaware State doubles to F. E. Dixon and Alexander Thayer yesterday in three out of four sets. Tilden played brilliantly in spots, but his mishaps were costly and his court work not the best.

Time and again he missed shots which had been in position, he would have returned. Tilden tried to cover too much of the court, and often takes shots right in front of his partner. This works well form one weak player and one strong player where a team, especially in the mixed doubles a style which has brought Tilden so many victories.

Tilden must learn to play the doubles game without crossing over to his partner's side of the court. He must trust Beck to look after his own side and take his share of the shots. Team work is out of the question when one player attempts to do more than his share of the work, and the results of such tactics is ultimate disaster.

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KNIGHT LEADS IN AMATEUR FINALS

In First Eighteen Holes in Championship Golf Tourney Has Buxton 2 Up

PLAY MOST INTERESTING

WHITEMARSH, Pa., June 30.—Fred W. Knight of Aronimink led Cameron B. Buxton of Huntingdon Valley, at the end of the first eighteen holes of the thirty-six hole final round of the individual championship of Philadelphia here today, 2 up.

Probably no more interesting golf has ever been witnessed in the final round of this event, and the fact that Knight had a 73 for the eighteen holes to Buxton's 74 proves that both men played very fine golf. The going was in favor of Knight, but the Aronimink representative, on the whole, deserved his lead.

The champion drew first blood, for on the first hole he was on the green in two, to Knight's three and took two putts. The second was halved in par four, but on the third, Buxton put his approach shot into the creek and took a five to Knight's four. Knight was a trifle lucky, for his approach shot only just cleared the trees and landed on the green. Knight played a very poor tee shot on the fourth and went into the creek, and followed it up with a poor third. Buxton was short of the hole with his tee shot, but won the hole with a four to a five, making him one up again.

Buxton's second was just off the green to the right of the hole and, although he made a bold bid for a three, he failed by inches only. Knight was wonderfully lucky on the sixth. His tee shot was in the rough to the right and he put his second into the pit at the back of the green to the left. The ball was nicely teed up and, clipping the ball out, Knight put it in the cup fifty feet away. Buxton was on in two and had a long putt for a three and naturally failed to make it. On the seventh Buxton drove out of bounds and took four to reach the green.
