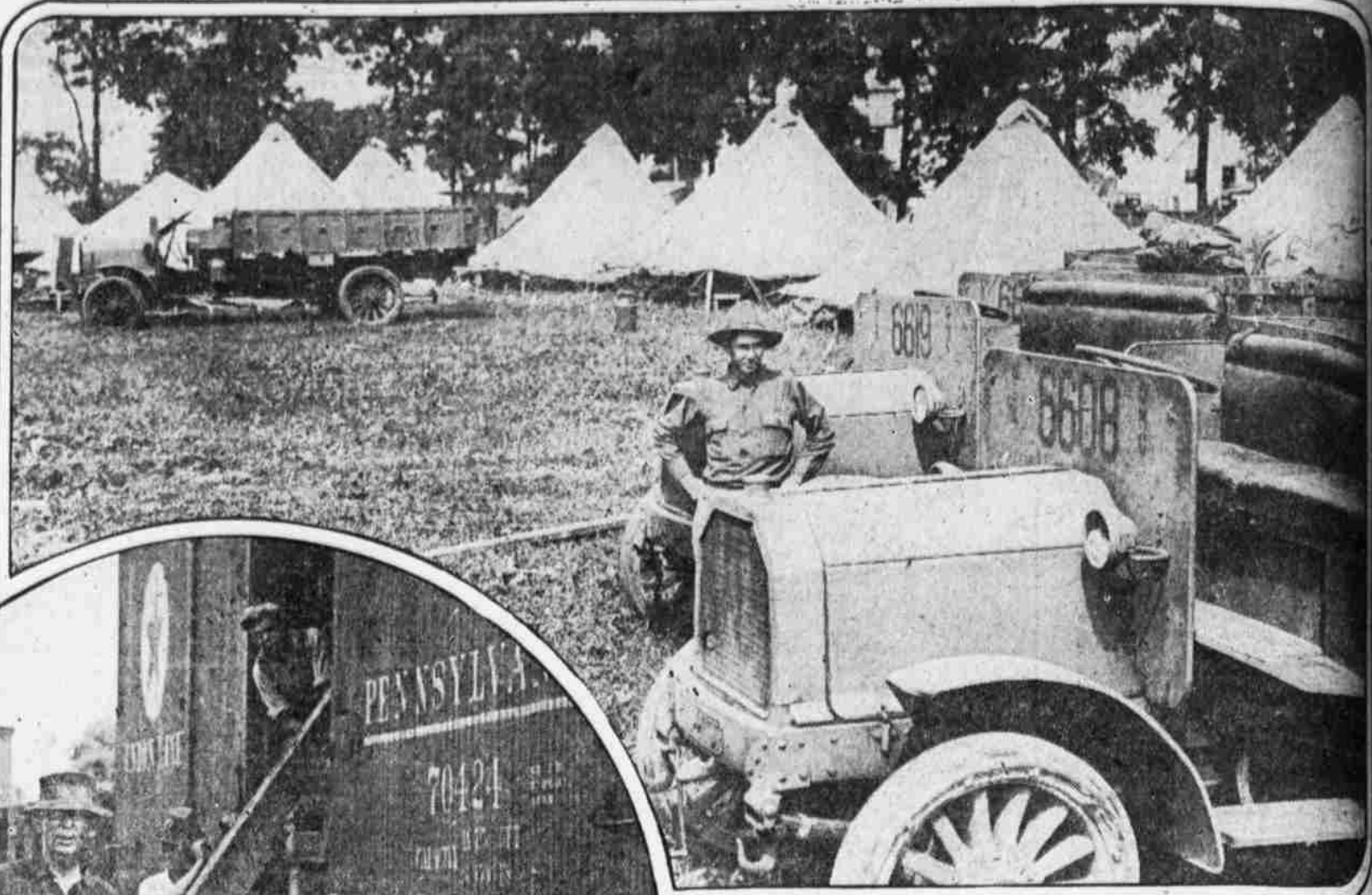


WRIGHTSTOWN, FUTURE HOME OF AN ARMY, IS TAKING SHAPE WITH DYNAMIC SPEED

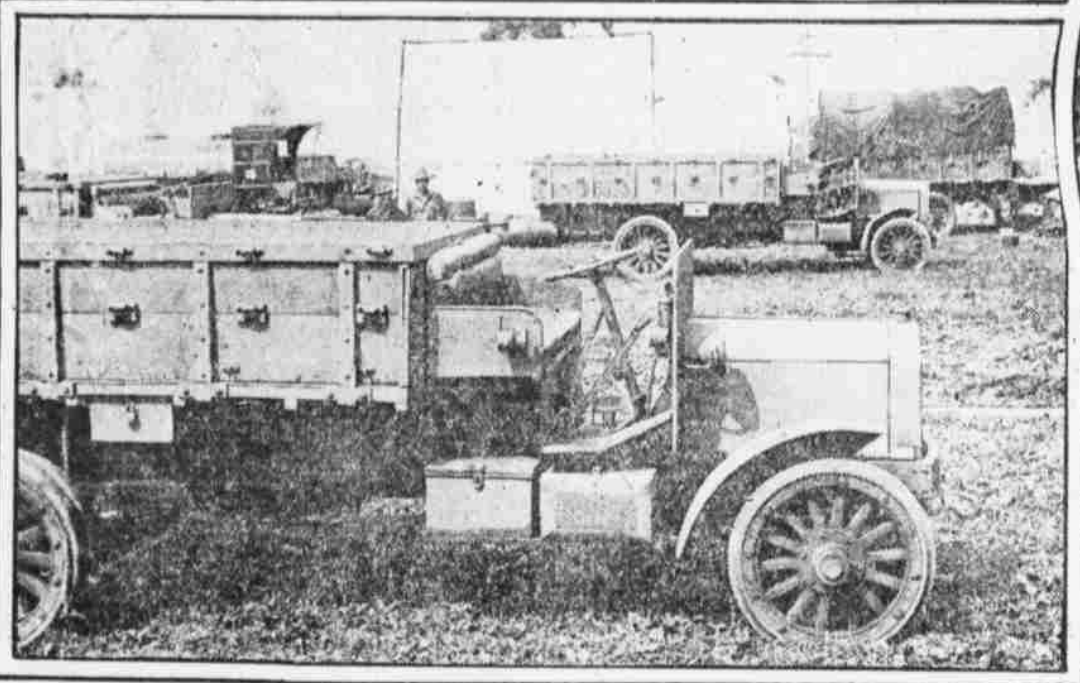

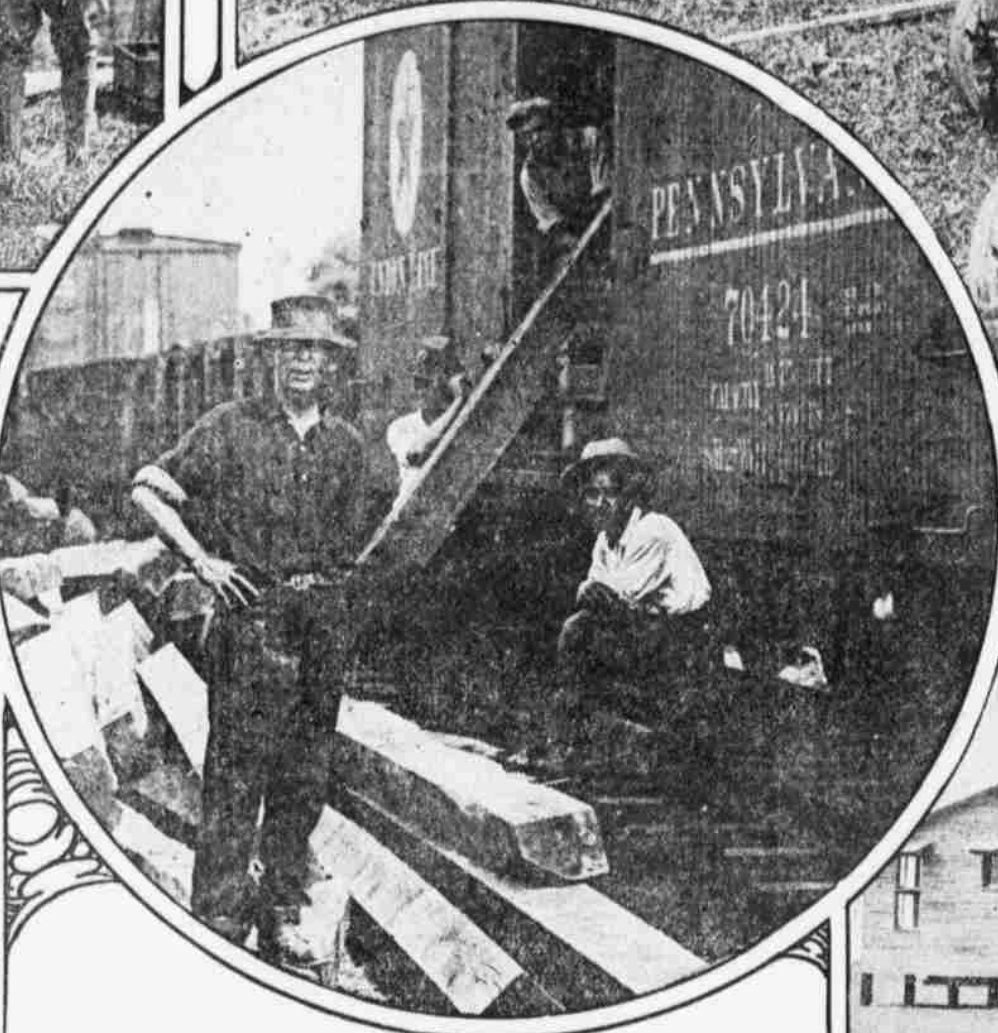
SUNBURNED MEMBERS OF THE MOTOTRUCK COMPANY
Direct from the torrid heat of San Antonio, Tex., are at home in building the telegraph station.



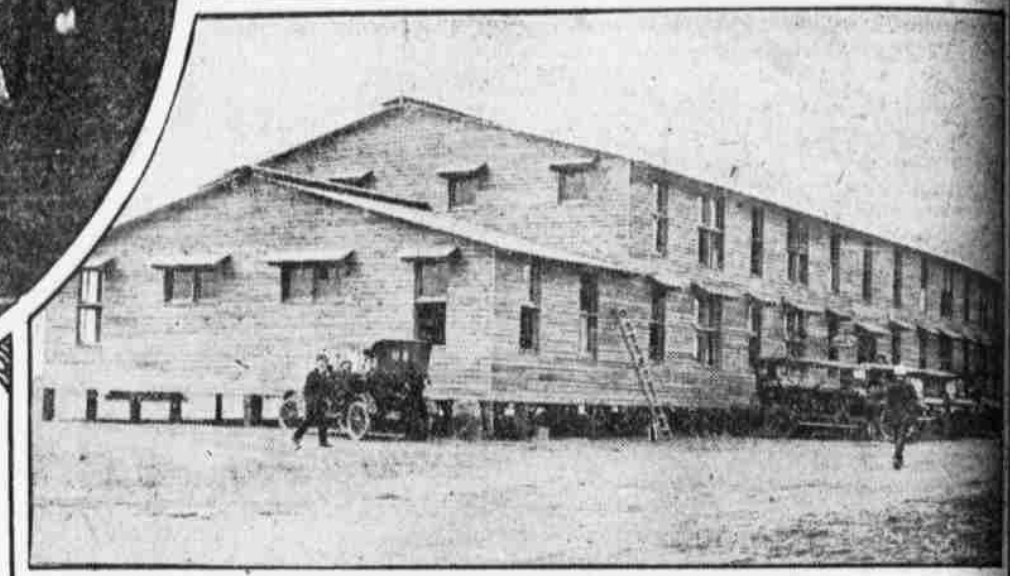
EIGHTEEN MEN AND THIRTY TRUCKS KEPT BUSY
Hauling lumber and materials for the rapidly rising structures.



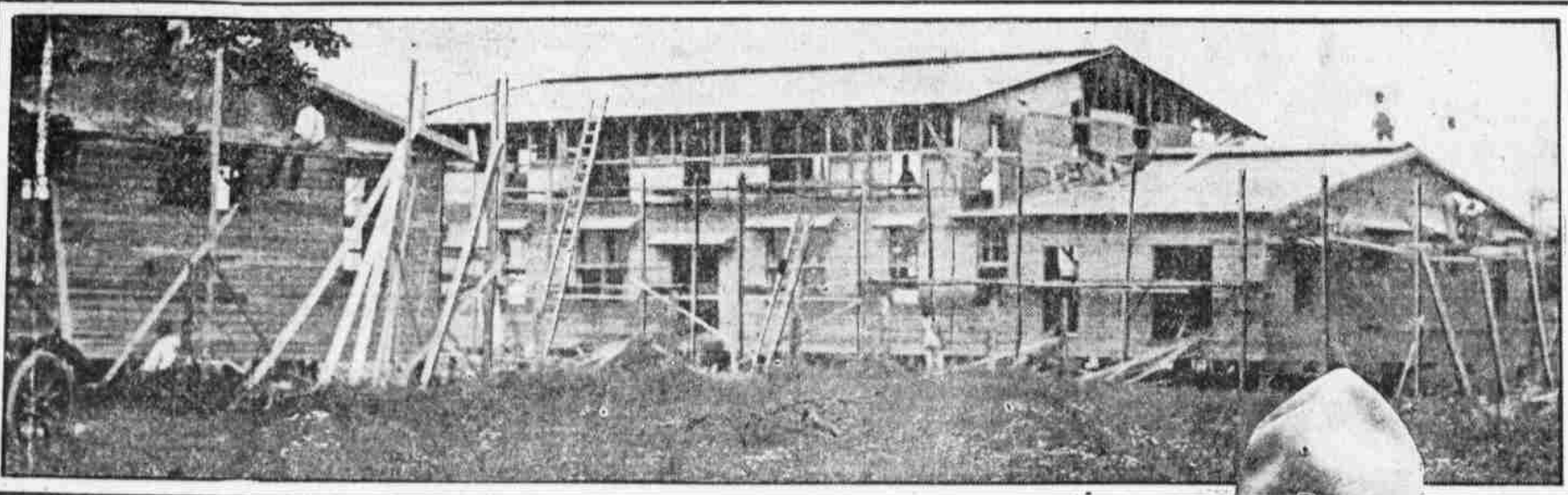
THE PORTION OF THE CAMP SET APART FOR TEMPORARY BARRACKS
For the Sixty-fourth Mototruck Company, U. S. A., already presents a military and businesslike appearance.



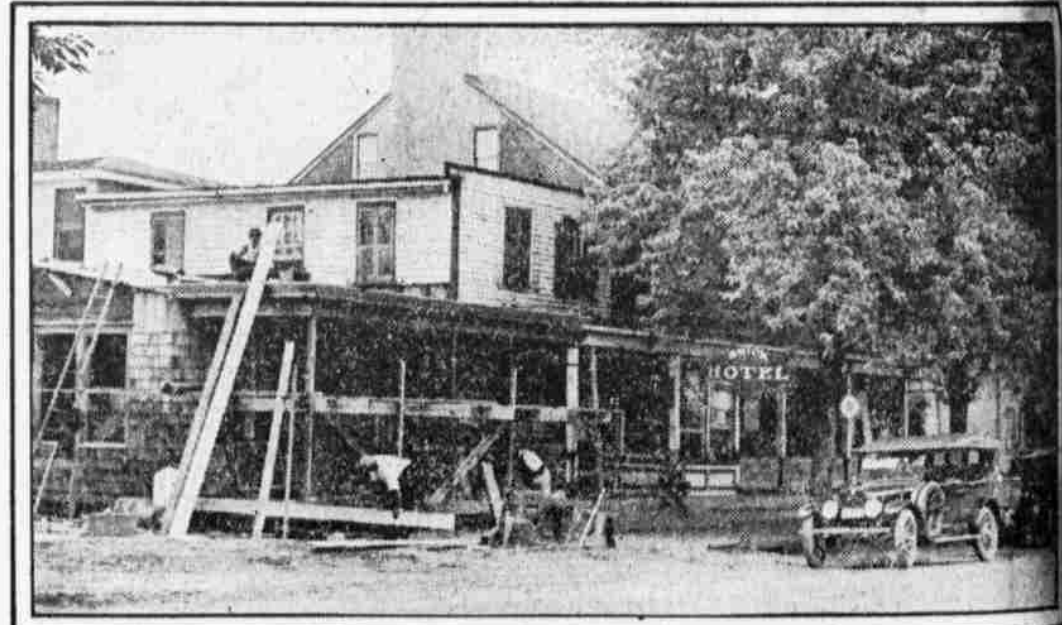
RAILROAD TIES ARE BEING UNLOADED

To house the several thousand men comprising the military population of governmental Wrightstown.



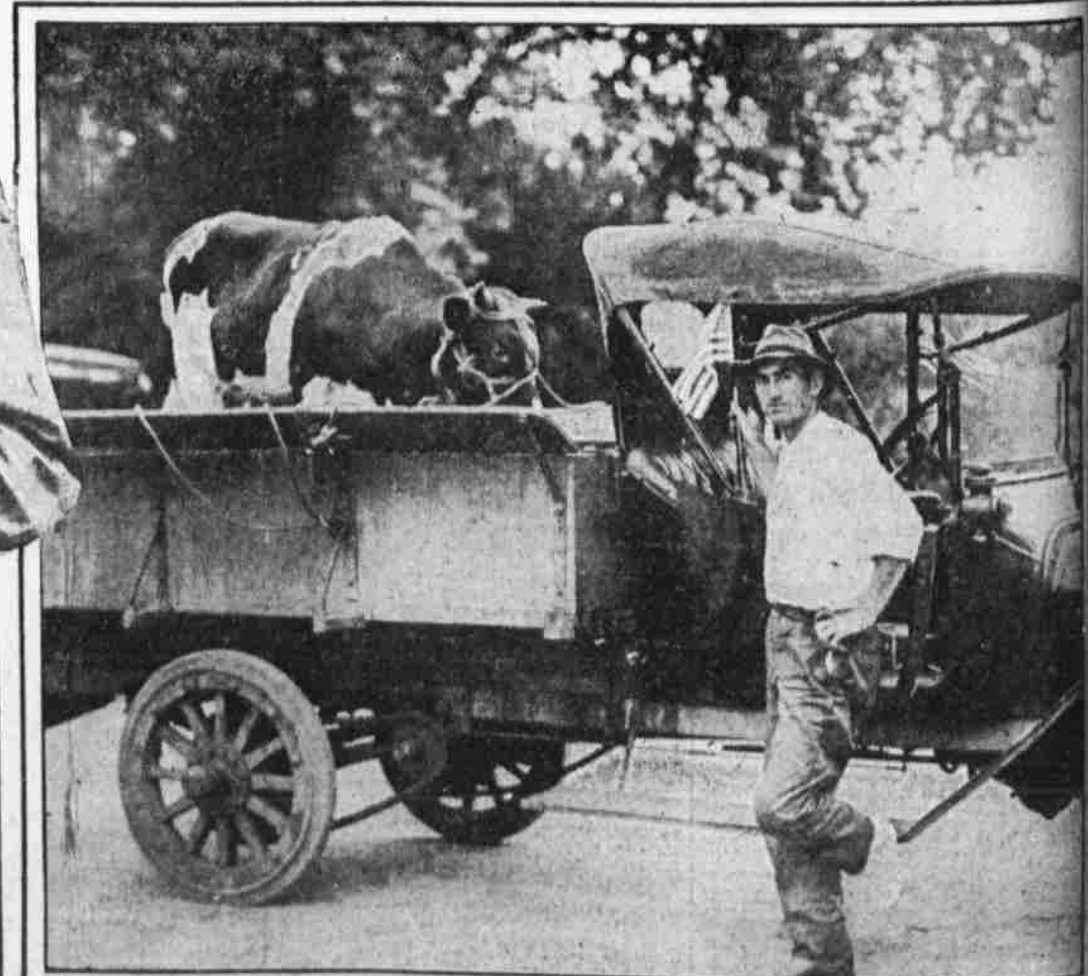
VILLAGE ENTERPRISE IS MANIFEST
