









EIGHTEEN MEN AND THIRTY TRUCKS KEPT BUSY Hauling lumber and materials for the rapidly rising structures.

THE HEADQUARTERS OR EXECUTIVE BUILDING


For the Wrightstown camp is well under way and will be one of the first structures
