Charles A. Miller Was Chosen Unanimously to Succeed Doctor Meals. City Clerk 25 Years

HARRISBURG, Pa., July 12.-Charles A. Miller. Mayor of Harrisburg for the last two months, died early teday at his home two months, died early teday at his home in this city. Mayor Miller was in poor health for several years, but it was not until two weeks ago that he was confined to hed. He was a Republican in politics, but was elected Mayor by the unanimous vote of a mixed Council to succeed the late Dr. E. S. Meals, who also died in office. Mayor Miller was city cierk of Harrishurg for more than a quarter century and was a recognized authority on municipal law. Before entering the city service he was a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature and city councilman.


