The sentry had to attend to some details at the station, and while he was doing so his horse and one of the prisoners disappeared. The sentry spied the missing animal standing rideries in front of James Mullin's saloon at Fifteenth and Federal streets. The man who took the horse was in civilian's clothes and was in the set of taking a drink before the bar. The mentry told the bartender the customer was an enlisted man and should not be allowed liquer. A few loiterers in the saloon butted into the matter and expressed disapproval of the matter the future'the military austentry's actions. 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
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
