

THE CAMERA REVEALS CARLISLE AS A CENTER OF LEARNING AND A CITY OF GREAT BEAUTY






CONWAY HALL FOR BOYS ALSO HAS ITS HOME IN CARLISLE


Here boys of high-school age are prepared for the splendid courses offered at Dickinson College,



The home of Dr. H. T. Sadler has an appropriate setting in this fair city in the Cumberland Valley.




CARLISLE IS FAMED FAR AND NEAR AS THE HOME OF THE INDIAN SCHOOL.
